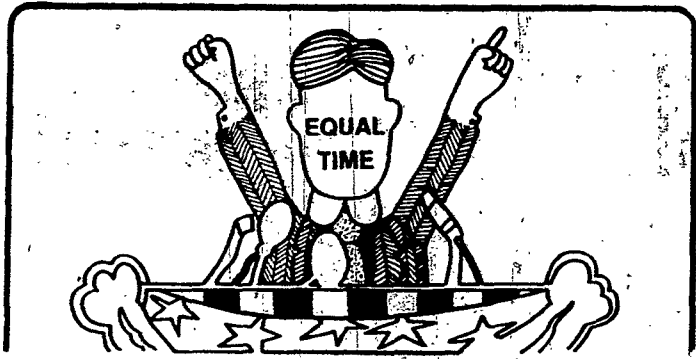
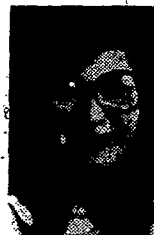

friends at school and says she has found both the faculty and students caring, helpful people who have made her feel welcome and at home and have taught her a sense of "togetherness."



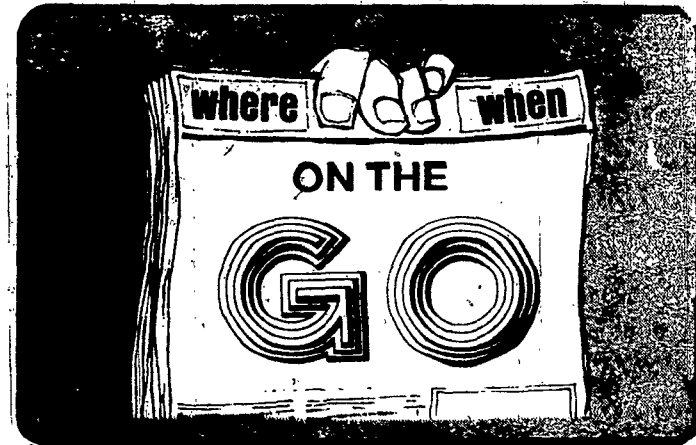
