

Medicaid Abortions Seen As War Against the Poor

A bill to ban Medicaid abortions in New York State, except to save the life of the mother, has been in-troduced by State Sen. James H. Donovan of Chadwicks and 17 other senators.

Present administration policy permitting Medicaid payments for abortion constitutes a "war against the poor," Donovan said last week in a media release commenting on the bill, S-6722.

"We have never had a law permitting Medicaid abortions," he said "The State of New York spent years in court trying to win the right to ban Medicaid abortions by regulation.

And when the state finally won that right, the victory turned suddenly hollow, for Governor Carey refused to exercise it."

Noting that New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Connecticut prohibit Medicaid abortions, he said it was up to the Legislature "to prevent New York from becoming the abortion mecca of the country."

'Poor women don't bear rich children, although some of those children might turn out that way if permitted to live," the senator said "Poor women bear poor children, and apparently the administration thinks we can rid ourselves of poverty if we rid ourselves of the children.'

Operation Breadbox Underway in Diocese

Operation Bread Box, a program designed to educate diocesans about three impoverished countries as well as raise funds for agricultural selfhelp programs for each, is well under way in 70 parishes of the diocese.

Dr. John Kowalsky, this year's chairman for Bread Box, said that all the participating parishes have received the information packets on the project and 10 parishes have requested homilists to speak on the problems of world hunger so far.

The program, sponsored by the International Justice and Peace Commission, concentrates on areas in three third world countries that are having serious food problems.

Money raised during the

Lenten program will go to Gorom-Gorom -in Upper Volta, Africa; Macuspana, Mexico and the Sayangun Catholic Mission in the Philippines. Both Gorom-Gorom and Macuspana were recipients last year. The Sayangun Mission was suggested as a recipient by State University at Brockport professors Dr. Robert Thompson and Dr. José Betancourt, a member of the Justice and Peace Commission.

Regions, parishes and individuals who are participating in Bread Box may select one of the three areas their money will go. Kowalsky said that Macuspana was selected by 30 parishes with the remainder divided equally among the other areas.

Kowalsky, who also teaches at Brockport State

in the Biology Department, noted that 75 percent of the money raised will be sent to the three areas. Twenty-five percent will go to local hunger efforts to be determined by diocesan règional assemblies.

All administrative costs for the project come out of the Justice and Peace Commission's budget, he added

and 82 parishes all over the diocese participated. Kowalsky said that although the number of parishes has gone down, he is still hopeful that a similar amount can be raised in 1978
