Panama Canal

This newspaper has been on record since last September as strongly favoring the new Panama Canal Treaty. We listed at length our reasons in a special editorial page presentation last Sept. 27.

As just about everyone knows, the arguments on either side of this issue are strong. The upcoming battle in the United States Senate over ratification will be formidable.

Of the many viewpoints presented, we still feel that the position of Archbishop Marcos G. McGrath is one of the most effective.

The Panamanian archbishop says that a new treaty will be in the best interests of the United States. "The U.S.," said the archbishop in an interview with the Courier-Journal last April, "can really open a new era in relation to Latin America... Carter has an opportunity here to begin something new. We've been so used to having the U.S. get away with whatever it wants to do because it's the stronger party – this can really be done on the basis of the interests of all involved."

As the specter of communism looms uneasily over the nations of Latin America, it makes sense for the U.S. to begin to make some inroads of its own — but not the usual ways of massive giveaways, or gifts with strings attached, or increased armament.

Where possible we should use the most effective tool of all – good will. And perhaps nowhere more than Panama is this so obviously possible.

The diocesan Justice and Peace Commission has put together a position paper in favor of the treaty and hopes to make it available to all parishes. Check with your parish Human Development Committee for a copy.

Really Special

Proclamations of special days or weeks have become so commonplace that they have lost their impact. That is why, perhaps, not many realize that we are in the middle of the 45th annual Brotherhood Week.

Dr. David Hyatt, president of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, in noting this important week, has called on Americans to support the idea with a renewed commitment to stamp out bigotry and prejudice.

He decried the fact that neo-Nazi and Ku Klux Klan groups are still spreading their venom, a theme of many editorials in this newspaper.

"We must not let the evil history of anti-Semitism, anti-Catholicism, or the awful bit-terness resulting from the scars of racism, to repeat themselves in new guises and new slogans," he said.

We urge that each family, perhaps as a positive offering for Lent, sit down together some time this week and discuss the necessity of brotherhood in this embittered world. We urge every parent to alert the children to the evils of Nazism and of the KKK.
