The subject was parking. He insisted there was no problem parking downtown. said there was. We were both right. Some days like the recent "I Love Downtown" festival there is, most other days, there is not


I took most seriously the idea of what I should wear since heretofore my wardrobe has consisted of items suitable for going to the grocery, school, church and an occasional night out.


