## Brown's leing Expertise Watched Closely by Pros

hockey Aquinas defenseman Jim Brown is having the time of his life right now with the "junior" Rochester Monarchs of the New York-Penn Hockey League, a cut or three above the local Monroe County High School Hockey circuit.

And, if veteran hockey observers are correct, the Aguinas senior has a whale of a hockey future ahead of

While many fans who have watched Brown mature and improve on the ice in the past four years predict big star status in the sport a few years down the road, Brown is only concerned, for the moment, where he'll hang his hat this

"I'm just looking at the colleges right now; that's the main thing," Brown says. "You never know what's going to happen."

His grades are fairly good good enough to earn hockey scholarship look-emover trips to a number of colleges and universities including Notre Dame, Michigan, Wisconsin, Brown and Colgate, Clarkson.

Brown says when he arrives on a particular campus he's found he has to look out for himself. There's nobody there who really holds his hand.

When he gets back home he shares the experience with his parents and Monarchs' -coach Andy Laing whom Brown describes as "more than a coach." الما والمناهدة المناهدة المناع

The Monarchs are in the thick of the championship in the NY-P, topping the heap by three points with seven games to play; then come the playoffs.

Brown has always played defense and he's always been a big one by comparison with his hockey peers - right now he stands 6-3 and weighs 200; as a freshman at AQ he stood about 6-even and weighed 180.

He hasn't always played. hockey exclusively however.

"I played the first two years on the freshman-JV football teams. They got a little rough though, so I figured I'd get out and play an easy game," he says with tongue in cheek.

He was deep into hockey before he arrived at Aguinas. He started when he was 8 years old in Canton, N.Y., where his parents lived at the time.

He's never had the desire to move into another position although he admits he does like to put the puck in the net once in awhile.

"I like to have everything in front of me; you don't have to keep turning around to look for the puck," he explains.

His NHL hero is Jerry Korab, a defenseman with the Buffalo Sabres.

"He's about my main man in the NHL — Jerry Korab he's big and rough." His AHL favorite is John Bednarski, a former Rochester has predicted elevated American who's now status in the sport for Brown playing with New Hayens awall along the water or wifeb based

Sherbrooke, Quebec, for a couple of days after a representative of that hockey team caught one of Brown's performances in a Monarchs' game at Lakeshore Rinks.

Brown explains that hewas told more or less that he could jump right into the pros if he played with the Sherbrooke team for two or three years.

But that's so shaky. You have to be a real standout; that's super hockey. I was surprised at the difference."

If Brown did play for Sherbrooke, it could mess up his eligibility for U.S. college hockey, he adds, and he doesn't want that to happen.

If things go right, Brown could end up being drafted by an NHL (or WHA) pro team anyway.

"They're drafting as many college players into the pros as they are the juniors. Your chances are fairly good, even if you go to college."

Brown made a choice as a junior to go with the Monarchs instead of playing school hockey for Aquinas. Actually, Brown could have moved up to the Monarchs in his sophomore year, but he decided to play for the Dewey Avenue icers a second year.

When he did jump to the NY-P, it didn't come as a real surprise to Aquinas Coach Bill Lukesonas who

When he looks back, he considers playing at AQ in his sophomore year a slight mistake because he realizes now the competition just, wasn't there.

He found that playing hockey at the high school level wasn't as tough or ashard as it first was for him. In fact he is presently feeling his oats in the NY-P too and he has to be careful that he doesn't get careless and end up on Laing's "other list."

He's honest with himself to realize he has to find a really good college hockey program that will more than challenge him.

If it weren't for the Monarchs, however, Brown doesn't think he'd be looking at Notre Dame, or vice versa.
