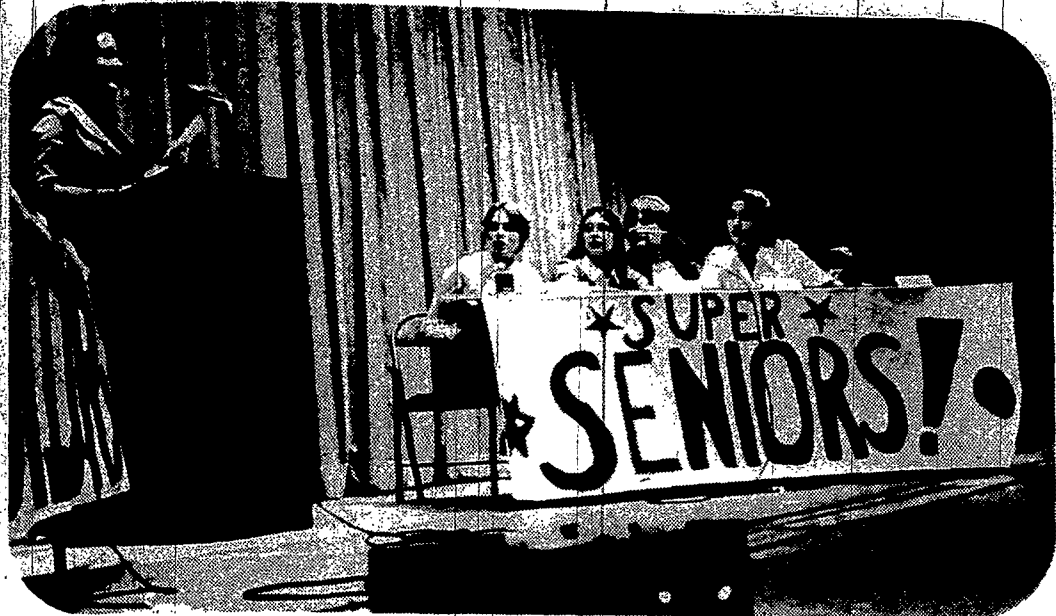

All contest questions were formulated by the faculty and it was National Honor Society moderator Patricia Sullivan along with co-

moderator Sandi Shusda who coordinated the event.

The students, once selected for the teams, held practice sessions to prepare for the rapid fire answering techniques required for the contest. The rounds consisted of toss up questions with the first team answering correctly eligible for a bonus question. Though the juniors put up a valiant fight, the seniors emerged victorious with the

Twenty-five CAM members, under the guidance of Sister Jane Schur, served refreshments and conducted game activities which were geared toward development of motor skills and social interaction. Holy Childhood staff members noted that the Mercians reached out with dignity and respect to the handicapped.

Mercians Nancy Grady and Mary Beth Vasile, who have devoted their services to the mentally retarded students at Holy Childhood intend to continue this interest in their career fields. Nancy has chosen to pursue special education and Mary Beth is seeking a career in pediatric nursing, specializing in work with the multi-handicapped. Both girls feel that the special children at Holy Childhood have had a strong influence on their career plans.

Over at McQuaid, members of the Christian Enthusiasts Club (CHE)

participate regularly in a volunteer program at Holy Childhood. The program, directed by Fathers William McCusker and Matthew Roach, supplements the academic and physical education programs for the mentally retarded children.

Each Tuesday morning, students Frank Cinelli, Greg Schott, Philip DiPasquale and Greg Burgart assist in the adapted physical education program at Holy Childhood. This program is designed to develop the children's motor skills through exercise and sports appropriate to their needs. Greg and Frank also offer academic tutoring to the children.

On Wednesdays, the YWCA offers its swimming and gymnastic facilities to the school. McQuaid swim team members R.J. Dolan, Matt Nicosia and Jeff LiButti assist in the instruction.

In other sport areas, Douglas Boccardo, George Falcon, Charles Graham, Joseph Carney, Tom Schott, Vau Gratett and John Scott assist in basketball instruction.

Sister Seraphine Herbst, director of Holy Childhood School commented, "The support of the members of the CHE program has been most beneficial to the mentally retarded children at the school. No doubt, it has been just as important to the McQuaid students in the program. We admire and appreciate their generosity."
