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Chrism Mass Set March 21 at Cathedral


Mass will be celebrated by Bishop Joseph L. Hogan at Sacred Heart Cathedral at 8 p.m., Tuesday, March 21.

The annual liturgy includes the blessing of the oils which are used throughout the year to administer the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Orders and the Anointing of the Sick.

Auxiliary Bishops Dennis W. Hickey and John E. McCafferty and the 10 regional coordinators will join Bishop Hogan in the concelebrated Mass which also affirms the unity of the priesthood and the ministry of all the people of the

Two Pastors Retiring

Father Leo E. Lynch, who has been plagued by illness for a long time, quit his Seneca Falls pastorate this week. Easier work will be found for him when he is able to come back, Bishop Dennis W. Hickey said.

Father Francis Kleehammer, founding pastor of St. Rita's in West Webster, also stepped down. He reached the retirement age of 70 last Dec 8. Several other retirements are imminent, Bishop Hickey said.

Father Lynch became pastor of St. Patrick's, Seneca Falls, in June 1969, after 18 years as a chaplain, first at St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell, then at St. Ann's Home. Ordained Dec. 18, 1943, from St. Bernard's, he served as assistant at St. Mary's, Elmira, until 1951. Father Lynch was brought up in Rochester in a family of nine children. Two of his sisters entered the St. Joseph congregation and an older brother, the late Father Joseph Lynch, was ordained with Father Leo's

Father Kleehammer, of the class of 1933, was appointed in 1950 to organize St. Rita's Parish. By 1955, he had a school, as well as a church, and by 1960, a bigger school and a convent. He is a native of Rochester, from Holy Redeemer Parish and he spent the first 17 years of his priesthood in the city, at St. Andrew's, Ss. Peter, and Paul and St. Michael's.

Courier Wins Press Awards

Albany - The Courier-Journal has won the 1977 first prize for Community Service among weekly newspapers across the state for its campaign to raise funds to purchase water filters for the families of Vila Bella, Brazil, it was announced by the New York Press Association here last Saturday.

The Rochester diocesan newspaper also won prizes for General Excellence and for Raparound, its youth section, in the Best Newspaper Promotion Idea category.

Anthony J. Costello, publisher and general manager of the Courier lournal accepted the awards for the Catholic diocesan weekly, the only

such newspaper to be honored in the state competition.

"The three awards reflect the broad range of the Catholic Courier," Costello said. || couldn(t be more pleased. The prizes are in areas that are among the main concerns of all newspapers - community, general excellence and communication with youth.

"The awards are a tribute : to the paper's editor, Carmen Viglucci, and his staff for their work in making our diocesan newspaper one of the very best among all the weekly newspapers in the entire state.

Community Service award, the press association noted that the goal of the filter campaign was "to raise enough money to purchase 1,800 water filters for a small town in Brazil. The paper used a coupon and full page color advertisements to aid its cause and ended up by providing 2,100 water filters. Seldom do newspapers get involved in affairs beyond their own circulation borders, so the Courier-Journal's effort was doubly noteworthy.'
