Death Penalty May Be Valid

The current debate concerning the death penalty has been much in the news lately.

I suspect that to an informed observer residing outside our community it must often seem as if we Catholics stand never so straight to attention as when the evening news is aired, while the rest of our days are passed with our heads together in conferences, seminars, delegations and groups plotting the strategy of the faith. What real difference, he is tempted to ask, is there between Catholics and, say, the Jewish Zionists? The one differs from the other only in that it took the Catholics somewhat longer to devolve into a political force; just as the Zionist listens attentively for news of the administration betrayal of Israel, so now all truly active Catholic believers dare not miss the first journalistic hint that Christ, like a bill, has once again been killed in committee.

But what is this faith we fear for, and feel must be guarded by an act of Congress? Will the reinstitution of the death penalty in fact rebuke and negate the Incarnation?

I have seen in conspicuous, and conspicuously Catholi¢, places fliers which summarize the debate (in less than one page) and end with great bold letters in a call to action against the measure because of our belief in the love of Christ and the sanctity, dignity and integrity of the human person. Yet I wonder at the connection. Precisely, I wonder if it is the Christ-love, or even the love of the Christlove at however great a distance that actually motivates our startling communal vociferousness. One cannot believe - and one may believe that any true lesson can be learned from a crowd. God Himself has ever only been a Single Mouth, or a still, small voice in the wind.

Unless we speak particularly of religious communities (speaking thus with qualification and always referring to the ideal which guides them); we can hardly say otherwise than that men, when they band together, do so not that they may love God better, but to find instead a poorer but more comfortable substitute in numbers for that Community to which all are called though few chosen. It is, I feel, rather from this less radiant huddle - which we know as society - that the judgment of our motives must come and not surely from some privileged and largely fictitious life of atone-ness with God

Within this perspective, then, it should not prove beyond the limits of human reason that the death penalty may actually stand

upon a certain validity of its own. Should we say only that at one time it was the result of a mystical idea in which the object was to "save" (in a spiritual sense) both society and the culprit, still, before the debate may be joined on either side we might want to consider the inordinate passion of our interest in this question. And precisely here may be revealed to us, however obliquely, a consequence of the depth of that division from God in which we all share, that we choose a side more readily when the cost to us is the least.

NFP Wins Increasing Favor, Research Physician Says

than 400 delegates from 35 countries gathered at the University of Melbourne recently for a conference called by the World Organization of the Ovulation Method (Billings). The majority came from Asia and Africa, and many stayed for a teacher-training program.

The conference marked the 10th anniversary of Pope Paul's Humanae Vitae, which reaffirmed the traditional Church ban on artificial birth control. The Billings in the international organization's title refers to two Australians who are regarded as authorities on natural family planning -Dr. John Billings and his wife, Dr. Evelyn Bilings.

Delegates who took the training course are expected to run family planning centers in their own countries and to train more teachers of the Billings method, which involves determination of fertile and infertile phases in a woman's menstrual cycle. The method is being taught in more than 75 countries, according to Dr. Joseph Santamaria, a trustee of the






