According to reports, this battle was a decisive factor in turning the Iroquois away from the French permanently and allying them with the English in the subsequent French and India War and the American Revolution.

She told of searching for relics from the buried Seneca village of Gagnasaea which was burned in 1687 by an army of 3,000 French soldiers allied with 1,000 braves from various Canadian tribes. She explained that Governor de Denonville sent word to the two Jesuit missionaries at Gagnasaea that he was bringing a group to the village to discuss the beaver pelt trade with the Senecas. Trusting the

Pam described what was found at the dig, the methods used in the actual work and what information the relics held. She noted that the Mohawks had been one of the member tribes belonging to the Iroquois Confederation and also related Iroquois folk tales including the story of the "Little People" who inhabited Powder Mill Park in the days when the Senecas roamed this region.
