Nazareth College senior, Doreen LaDonna is a confident young lady, aware of herself and her abilities. For the last eight years she has been a product of and a motivating force within the changing status of women's athletics.

She began her basketball career, as a guard, at Bishop Kearney High School (1974 graduate) where for three years she held the honor of being the Most Valuable Player. Entering Nazareth College on an academic scholarship, she found a home on the school's fledgling basketball team. For the last three years she has been high scorer on the team — averaging 20 points per game.

This year her greatest delight has been Nazareth's reversing its losing trend by turning in an 18-10 record for the season. Without hesitation, Doreen gave the credit to her eight teammates — all freshmen! It seems that coach Deborah Karcane's intense recruitment program resulted in acquiring strong local talent and Doreen contended, "Nazareth is going to be good for quite awhile."

Another change she has seen during her career has been the growing interest in playing sports by women. She noted that when she tried out for the BK team, 15 others also tried out; now more than 50 potential players show up for try-outs. She also pointed out that in those days, it was in the high school where the girls first learned about basketball. The boys, however, through their elementary school teams, had been playing and developing their skills from an early age. This circumstance, she explained, is the reason she feels women, at this point in time, can't compete on the male level. A fact she sees changing because, today, the girls
