Sacramental Study Discussed

Elmira-The Chemung County General Education Board (CCGEB) discussed sacramental preparation in the schools, received notification of the resignation of two of its principals, and prepared topics for its April meeting at its regular meeting March

A proposal concerning sacramental preparation was presented to the board by Father Kevin Murphy, copastor of St. Patrick's. The proposal noted that the consolidated schools are not operated on a parish basis, and therefore sacramental preparation should be retained by the parish, and not done in the schools. At issue is preparation for first Eucharist and first Penance.

The lengthy discussion centered on whether or not approval of the proposal would constitute interference with parish operations, by requiring all parishes to, conduct preparation programs for students in Catholic schools.

Father Murphy explained in his proposal that "parents with children in a certain school are torn between the school and their home parish if the school is ac-tively involved in sacramental, preparation. Also a parish program of extensive sacramental preparation for parents of both public and Catholic school children is sabotaged if parents can opt out of the parish program and join in the school program-which

may be less demanding for that the Personnel Comthe parents."

Points were raised concerning the extra hardship that could be caused by requiring parents who already send their children to a Catholic school to participate in a separate sacramental program, as is now the case with Confirmation.

St. Çasimir's parish council discussed the issue, and reached a consensus that it should be decided by the pastors. He moved that the issue be deferred until after a pastors' meeting on the subject. After Father spoke against deferral, the motion was

Currently all pastors, all principals, and two representatives from each parish have membership. Further discussion of changes was tentatively scheduled for the April meeting.
