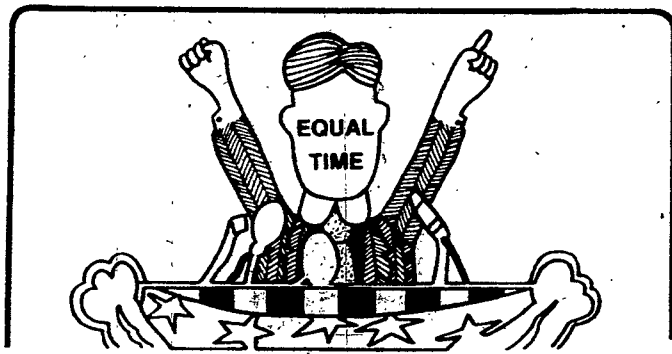

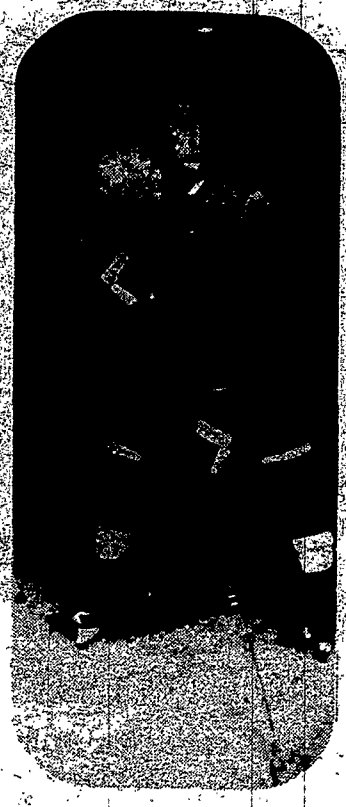
KELLY AND EMILY

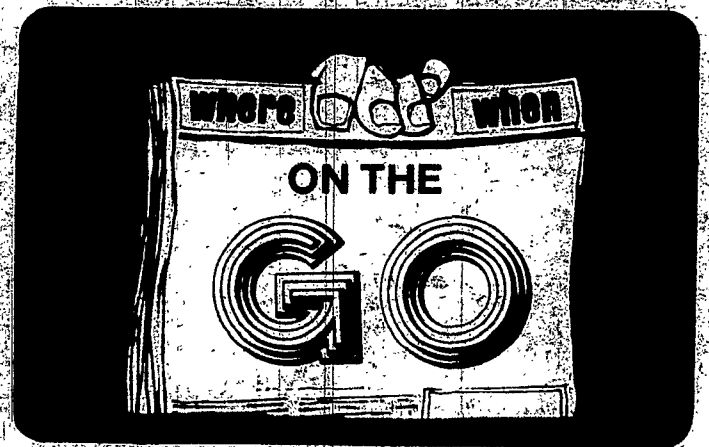
