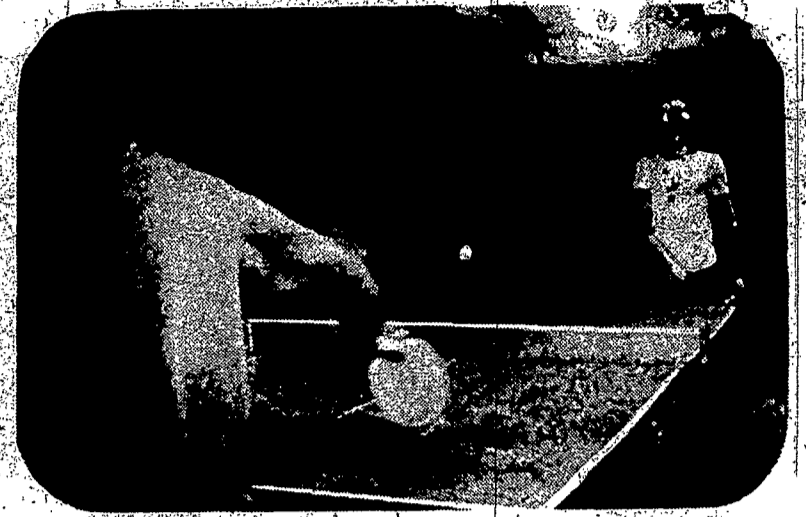
An Alternative to Incarceration

Delphi House, located at 143 West Avenue, offers a range of services to persons with substance abuse problems and subsequent court involvement.

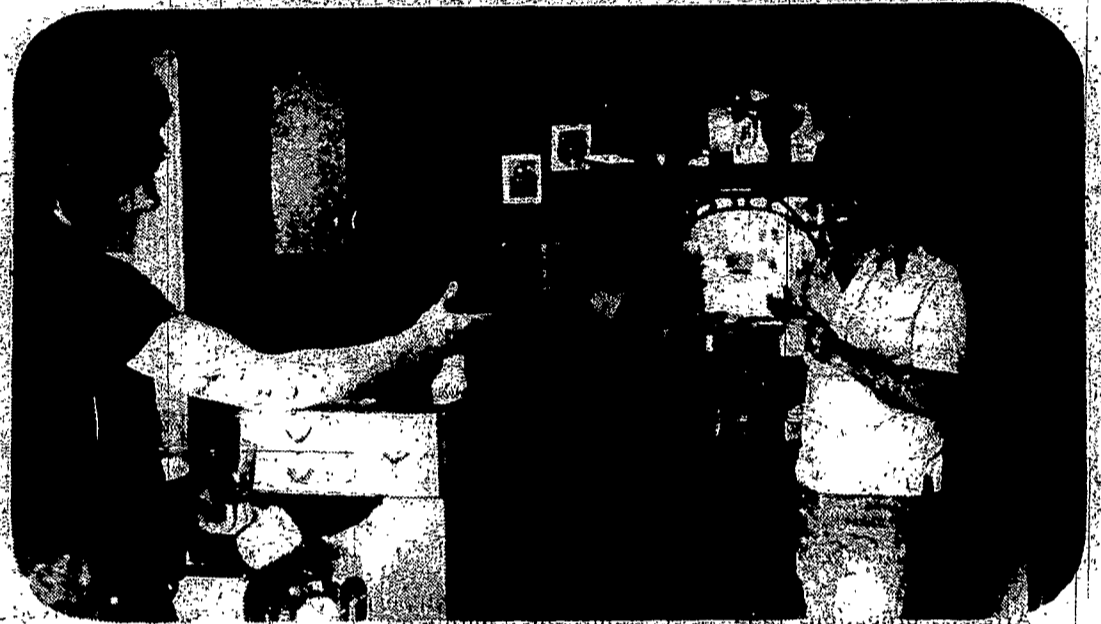
Delphi House provides the following services:

1. Initial screening and assessment of substance abuse history.
2. Intensive day-care rehabilitative treatment with emphasis on group and individual therapy, educational and vocational counseling, development of alternative interests and behavioral patterns, and preparation for return to educational or vocational training and placement. This is a minimum of a six-month commitment and includes reliance on existing Delphi House contractual agreements with related community agencies which provide educational and vocational services.
3. Structured outpatient counseling services for individuals needing support but presently functional in either an educational or vocational (occupational) setting. This would include weekly individual and group therapy and entails a minimum of six-month commitment. Day-care clientele routinely become involved in outpatient services after a more in-depth program.
4. Family therapy is also provided in multi-family group settings to help develop supportive and a more conclusive home environment. Delphi also works with parents or spouses individually.
5. Delphi House provides services to any individual with a history of any substance usage. The agency does not limit itself to work with "hard-core" addicts or individuals with specific drug involvement.
6. Delphi House will coordinate information through the attorney of record of all clients and will be present to represent the progress in treatment of any client on scheduled court dates.
7. The newest service of Delphi is a very active outreach program, to enlighten those abusers, unaware of Delphi, that help is available for them.
