Chemung County Jail Has First-Ever Mass

Elmira—An Mass offered Easter Mass offered in the Chemung County Jail was a landmark for the facility.

As far as is known, the Mass was the first ever offered in the jail.

Eight inmates attended the Mass, celebrated by Father Richard Murphy. Father Murphy reported that the men were "very enthusiastic" about the Mass, and "definitely wanted it again."

He added that he intends that the Mass be the first of monthly celebrations at the jail. He recently took over the duties of jail chaplain; he also is chaplain at Notre Dame High School and Community Corning College.

Easter Sunday also saw Mass offered in the Steuben County Jail,

Bath, by Father Richard Tormey of St. Mary's. He noted that 17 men attended the Mass, although he didn't know if all were Catholic. He reported that he didn't have time to talk with the inmates, who were taken to their cells immediately after the Mass, but added that he sees the possibility of more Masses at the facility in the future. He pointed out that usually from one-quarter to one-

third of the 40 to 50 in-

mates at the jail are Catholic.

Sister Margaret Mary Flynn, Offender Aid and Restoration director at the Chemung jail, called the Mass a "really good experience." She noted that a difficulty with religious programs in jails is that often inmates attend just to get out of their cells, and don't participate. Such was not the case for the Easter celebration, she said; one

inmate even served as a lector. She also noted that Father Murphy had been to the jail the previous day to hear confessions.

Father Murphy said that the assistance he received from acting chief jailer Harold Sechrist was helpful, noting that the inmates were allowed to go to the room where Mass was offered early and help set up, and no guards were visible during the Mass.

St. Joseph's Adds Eye Treatment Laser

Elmira-An estimated 1500 diabetic patients in the service area of St. Joseph's Hospital are potential vic-tims of the leading single cause of new blindness in the United States, Diabetic Retinopathy, a blood vessel disease of the eye's retina.

St. Joseph's, through the initiative of several local ophthalmologists, has joined in a cooperative effort to address the problem through the development of a diagnostic and treatment program.

Since 1974 St! Joseph's has utilized a Photo-coagulator and fluorscein Camera in the emergency service area for diagnosis and treatment of certain eye problems. The addition of an Argon Laser

now allows the treatment for Diabetic Retinopathy and other retinal problems.

Through contributions from the Anderson-Evans Foundation of Elmira and the Thatcher Glass Manufacturing Company, the pur-chase of the \$30,000 laser was accomplished. Appointments for free screening may be made through the Ambulatory Services Department, extension 539, at St. Joseph's Hospital.

With the commencement of the Diabetic Retinopathy Alert Program, a speaker's bureau also will make knowledgeable professionals available organizations for -informational programs.
