Junior Claire Hunt's painting of the Eiffel Tower won first place recognition in the French art division.

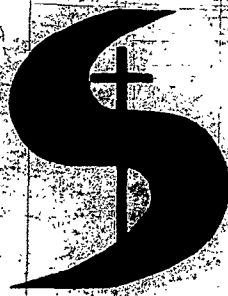
