The sisters also heard a report from Father Robert Kennedy, director of the diocesan Department of Liturgy, on the changes in the functions of his office, on the current state of liturgical renewal in the diocese and on his hopes for the future.

Father Kennedy noted that three years ago the stated function of his office was to help the faithful to express through ritual action and prayer the particular faith of the particular community.

The office now sees itself, he said, as advocate for full participation as educator, and as the developer of liturgical ministers, as well as being the developer of diocesan celebrations.

He noted that most of the office's work is centered on answering the immediate needs of parishes and educating in the principles of liturgical action.

He said that the diocese has entered the second phase of liturgical renewal. "Most changes have been implemented," he said, "... Now our emphasis is on the quality of celebrations.

He says there is a need "for the ongoing development of liturgical ministers," and a need "to understand what the role of the liturgy is in the life of the Church."

He cited the Second Vatican Council's definition of liturgy as "the summit and the source" of the Church's
