# The Track Meet 'Almost Was'

It's already been dubbed "the track meet that almost was." that abbreviated collision between once-beaten McQuaid and unbeaten Monroe last week at Frederick Douglass Junior High School.

Lest things get blown all out of proportion, McQuaid track coach Bob Bradley points out that relations between the two schools are not strained; there is, obviously a communications gap in there somewhere. He hopes the meet can be rescheduled, and he wishes he didn't use the word adamant during subsequent interviews about what happened.

And what did happen?

The battle between the two City-Catholic track teams ended after the first two relays, which the Knights won, when Johnny Anderson, Monroe track coach, took his troops off the field and went home.

The meet was being held as part of a double dual meet along with the regularly scheduled McQuald Franklin scrap at Douglass the former being postponed from its original date by rain.

The Knights eventually pasted Franklin, 89-38, for their fourth win in five starts,

while Monroe left in a huff with its unbeaten record of 4-0 intact.

While Bradley is not seeking (although the subject did come up) a forfeit as the result of Monroe's untimely exit, he also explains there's nothing in league rules to cover such a situation because it never happened before.

While there was a remote possibility the match could be rescheduled before this story is published, "That's very unlikely because Monroe is going against Kearney (also unbeaten at 5-0) on Monday (of this week) in a real big meet," Bradley said.

"Although that's a bye date for us, there's no possibility of our going in on that because that in effect would make Monroe be trying to beat Kearney and McQuaid with the same lineup. That would be unreasonable."

It's pointless, he explains, to question the use of officials as the basis for walking off the field.

"Anybody who knows track knows that of the 18 events in a track meet, I'd say, three of them might be decided on time. It isn't what your time is that determines an event winner, it's which

body gets across the finish line first.

"The only thing the officials were doing that was different in this meet was that they were just keeping one set of results (McQuaid-Franklin); but they were there to do anything that needed to be done and since they were only keeping the McQuaid-Franklin results, Johnny and I were supposed to be keeping the other results.

"This doesn't mean that there were no officials at the meet. As a matter of fact there were six officials there," Bradley explains.

Even if the officials had intended to record McQuaid-Monroe times, the only thing they would have put down on their sheets is what they did put down on their sheets, for example, after the first relay, "McQuaid, :45.2."

The officials agreed not to time any Monroe first places, but that didn't mean Monroe would not get the first place if it won an event — even if the Redjackets had won the first, second or even both relays. Bradley says he would have had a time on Monroe anyway.

"The officials would have

'The officials would have times us because they were getting the McQuaid-Franklin results; so on their sheets they would have put

McQuaid: 45.2 for the Franklin meet; and on the sheet that Johnny and I were going to work on, we would have had Monroe: 45 flat had Monroe won the event."

Ironically, for the two races that were run, time had no bearing on the races — McQuaid won the 440 yard relay with Monroe a good three or four yards back and the Knights won the two mile relay with the Redjackets a good distance back.

But Bradley admits he would have had to scramble the rest of the way to pull off a major upset win over the Redjackets whom he considers the class of the City-Catholic League.

He also didn't expect Monroe to have much trouble with Bishop Kearney

which handed his Knights their only loss to date.

Bradley put the best foursome he had against the Redjackets in the 440: senior Mike Reeves, senior Vaun Grattet, junior Craig Rice and sophomore Rich Price.

The :45.2 they recorded was the fastest time in the league so far this year. Monroe took second.

The two mile relay, also won by McQuaid, featured Denis Cushman, Joe Regan, Steve Burnett and Jon Horton — the last of the McQuaid Hortons. This quartet turned in a good 8:38.9.

Now Bradley hopes the track meet that almost was, will still become the track meet that is, sometime during the remainder of the season.
