

Corpus Christi, Alive and Well

Last year at this time, Corpus Christi School's future looked dim. Due to the problems besetting urban schools, it looked as if the school would have to close in June. Because of last minute efforts by concerned parents, who assumed financial responsibility, it was able to remain in operation.

According to Kathy Smith, Corpus Christi public relations director, the year was a successful one and next year even looks better. She noted enrollment was up to 180 students and that with one registration day completed and another scheduled for June, the school may possibly be operating two kindergartens this September.

Corpus Christi didn't have to face its problems alone. Throughout the year, other parishes came to the school's aid. St. Monica's and St. Augustine's presented benefit performances of "Good News" for the school's financial cause. Also, there were anonymous donations as well as donations from the alumni fund. And recently, upon submitting a proposed

Holiday Hours

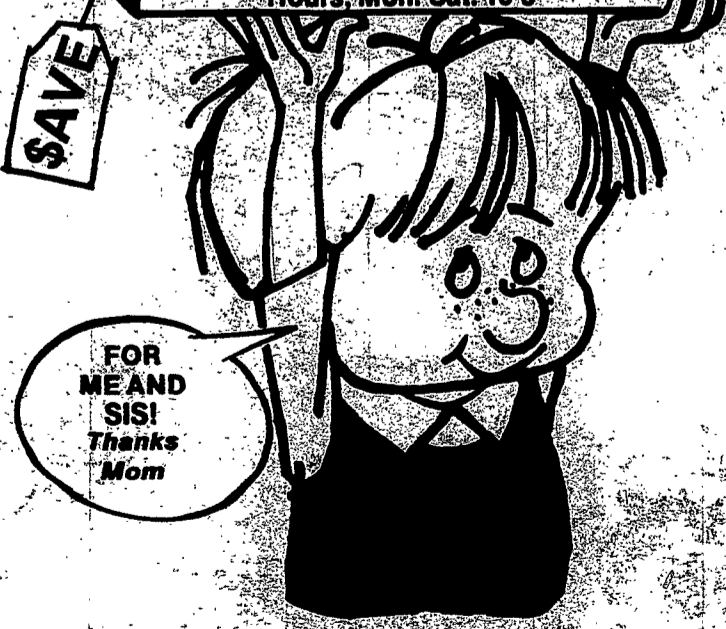
The entire public library system in Rochester will keep regular hours on Monday, May 29, but will be closed Tuesday, May 30, in observance of Memorial Day.
