## BK-McQuaid Share Golf Crown

Bishop Kearney's recent 6 1/2 - 2 1/2 golf victory over McQuaid was just what the doctor ordered for the Kings' Rob Horak. The win assured Kearney a share of the City-Catholic League golf championship with the Knights.

Horak, a senior, had seen his teammates drop seven league matches in a row to perennial league champion McQuaid over a four year period while McQuaid was piling up a win streak that went back two years further.

The Kings actually dropped nearly a dozen matches in a row to McQuaid in the last half dozen years — so Horak and his mates had plenty of respect for the perennial C-C champs whenever they met.

In fact, earlier this season McQuaid pasted Kearney 7 1/2 - 1 1/2 and it seemed just like old times.

Horak credits growth of his teammates as the major reason for the turnaround.

"We only had two guys on our team this year who were back from last year — myself and our second man Tom Buckley — so we have a young team which is inexperienced."

"We have seniors, but they've never played match league," Horak explains.

Horak fired a hot 36 against McQuaid in the nine hole match, the customary length in City-Catholic circles.

Actually Horak's score was three over par for the Durand Eastman course.

Buckley fired a 39 and so did teammates Bill Loftus and Mike Paduano, both seniors, and Tom Rutalis, a sophomore.

Mike Geitner, who also plays great hockey, says Horak, shot a 38; he's a junior.

In that match Horak was more than pleased to share medalist honors with the Knights' John Ryan and Mike Hurley — since BK won.

Most of the other McQuaid golfers shot in the low 40's, Horak says.

Horak says it was more a matter of Kearney improvement during the season rather than McQuaid's falling apart, in the match, which accounted for the upset win.

"Earlier this season we played them in bad weather and we weren't too sure of ourselves. But ever since that match we've been winning 7-2, 8 1/2 - 1/2, and by other big margins, building our confidence."

"We were really looking forward to the rematch," Horak says.

Whether there will be a rubber match between the two schools is undecided. There's no doubt Horak and Kearney will settle for a piece of the championship hardware if they can't get all of it.

Horak admits he took much personal delight in BK's big win.

"I knew we had it won on the seventh hole. We talked to our guys behind us and we could see we were winning. And we knew what our situation was — so we began to ease off, we were all smiles, and we began to congratulate each other because we knew we had it."

If this were football, there'd be a couple of thousand people in the stands watching. There's seldom anybody but the players on the golf course.

And Horak doesn't see the sport — at least at the high school level — ever drawing any fans.

It's a lonely sport to earn a varsity letter in, he agrees.

"I can't blame them (the would-be fans) because there's nothing exciting about it. I mean, for me, I like it a lot, but it's not much of a spectator sport," Horak says.

Ironically Horak also plays baseball and basketball; and if he were playing baseball for BK this spring instead of golf, there'd be fans on the sidelines as the Kings battle Mooney and Aquinas for top spot in C-C baseball circles.

Next year Horak hopes to be playing his college golf at Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana.

He doesn't have a scholarship, but he does have an understanding that he might qualify for one if he comes out for the team and does well.

"You make the team first, then they talk about scholarships," Horak explains.

His handicap at BK is two and this year he seems to be shooting about one or two over par on the average.

Four years ago as a freshman he was an 8 handicap and was firing away in the low 40's.

Horak has fared well in local golf circles, too, and

surely will be heard from in the future.

Last year he won the Rochester District Junior Championship and teamed with Irondequoit High's Tom Leinburger to win a men's bestball tournament.

Kearney also has a good shot at the golf sectionals which are based on individual scores, Horak explains.

"They go by your individual scores in the league matches; I think it's between myself and John Ryan (of McQuaid) for who's lowest. They pick the lowest six or eight from each league."

There is a City-Catholic qualifier prior to the sectionals however, but Horak expects the C-C sectional entries will be known by this week.

Kearney and McQuaid both finished with 6-1 records and in all honesty Horak says he's kind of glad the Kings are sharing the league crown with McQuaid.

"They've had the title for a long time and they are the team to beat. I don't mind sharing it because we're in good company with them."
