violence," he told the bishops and though his talk was concerned with abortion one could not separate the assassination of Mr. Moro from the message.

But even as the bishops met, a newspaper headline announced, "Rome Abortion Center Opens." The new center was established by the Association for Social Medicine to "offer free medical advice to women seeking abortions under the terms of the new law." Such centers also are planned for other Italian cities.

A newspaper editorial in an English language daily bore a strikingly similar resemblance to some of those printed in the United States.

The International Daily News wrote that the passing of the abortion law "after years of wasted death and illegal horror comes as a welcome though overdue surprise." It criticized the Catholic hierarchy and the Christian Democratic Party for avoiding "even the most minimal concession to the dignity and self-determination of women in a society which favors lawmaking, and law-breaking, men."

At the general audience of May 24, after a tumultuous welcome, Pope Paul, as is the custom, gave a capsulized version of his message in the various languages of those present. In French, he departed from his talk somewhat to mention the situation in Zaire speaking of the "many innocent civilians of every race and color who tragically lost their lives" in that African country.

Thousands in the new hall joined in singing, in Latin, the Our Father. As the pontiff left down the center aisle, he once again received a barrage of cheers from the faithful, who perhaps were putting a little extra effort into the customary applause in realization of his personal anguish over recent events. Flags waved, grown men cried, children cheered, and all pushed, shoved and grappled to get a better glimpse of this holy man.

Then it was over. Outside two police cars raced to the scene of an insignificant fender-bender. Soon they were joined by more policemen. They stand about and talk animatedly for a few minutes then race off.

In St. Peter's Square small groups gather to make plans for the day. Perhaps a visit to the Colosseum where Christians were massacred in another age or maybe to the Spanish Steps and the house where the English poet John Keats died.

It is a day like any other in this Eternal City. Almost.


