East High ousted Aquinas from the Section 5, Class AAA baseball tournament with an 8-2 win over the Little Irish at Monroe Community College.

East High pitcher Mike Luciano spaced 10 hits. The Irish got a man aboard at least every inning, but left 11 runners stranded.

Aquinas moved into the semifinals with a 7-0 win over Gates-Chili.

Lonnie Kaczka gained his seventh win in 8 starts by stopping the Spartans with four hits.

Cardinal Mooney was eliminated in the quarterfinals when it lost to East, 5-4. The Orientals' Jim Toluba's solo homer in the bottom of the seventh ended the game and the season for the Cardinals.

Larry Keenan drove in two runs for Mooney to tie the score at 4-4 in the top of the seventh.

Aquinas athletic director Dave Missell resigned, stating he didn't have enough time to accommodate the job... Missell is also head soccer coach at Aq and is studying for a master's degree in education at Nazareth College.

Aquinas baseball coach Rich Pilliter was named Coach of the Year in the City-Catholic Baseball League's Division One.

McQuaid won the Division One best overall sports record; Charlotte took the honors in Division II.

Mooney grad Glen Hagen, who starred in basketball at St. Bonaventure University, was chosen in the second round by the Philadelphia 76ers in the NBA college draft.

John Termotto, who transferred from McQuaid to Fairport High, lost in the opening round of the state tennis tournament to Bill Schillings of Orchard

Park. 6-0, 4-6, 6-7.

Termotto won two consolation round matches but defaulted in the third round.

Dennis Fitzpatrick, ex-Kearney, has been named assistant football coach at his Alma Mater... He graduated last month from Minnesota.

Aquinas will play Mooney, McQuaid, and Kearney in football on Friday nights at Hollender Stadium this fall... The Little Irish, Mooney and Madison have elected to move up to Class AAA from AA in football for sectional purposes this fall.

Carmen Rinaldi, a Kearney grad, has been named head basketball coach at Marshall High... He's currently assistant basketball coach to Sal Rizzo at East.

Former McQuaid athletic director and head basketball coach Ken Jones will conduct his 14th annual basketball camp at Eisenhower College, with the day camp being held at Allendale Columbia School, starting June 25.

## School Busing Funds Threatened Again

"Like a broken record," declared Timothy Leahy, diocesan superintendent of schools, in referring to the on-again City School Board proposal to eliminate busing funds for city children who attend parochial and private schools outside Rochester.

The board's proposal came in the wake of the recent state Court of Appeals ruling (The Waldert Decision) which stated the city has been collecting taxes illegally. This action requires the city to deduct \$32 million dollars from its budget and the financial setback has resulted in a six million dollar trimming from the city school budget.

Last year, transportation funds had been threatened because of delayed state Municipal overburden funds which were to result in 2.2 million dollar cuts from the school budget. That crisis, however, was resolved by the eventual payment of funds.

The difficulty this year, Leahy noted is that the proposed cut occurs two months later than in the 1977 crisis. "How to mobilize a force," he commented in explaining that the schools

1978-79 budgets have been formulated, schools are closing for the summer and students along with parents are headed for vacations. When they begin preparing for the reopening of school there's a strong possibility there won't be buses.

Though Leahy understands the need for budget cutbacks he observed they could be made in directions not affecting children. He also wonders why \$428,000 is used as the cost figure for busing when 90 per cent of that figure is reimbursed to the city by the state. With that in mind, he contends the actual cost to be \$43,000.

According to Leahy, there

are two options which could take the pressure off the busing cut; a school board member can make a formal motion to eliminate it as a cutback item, or the city council can designate a cut figure below the six million dollar amount.

The school board will vote on the budget within the next few weeks.

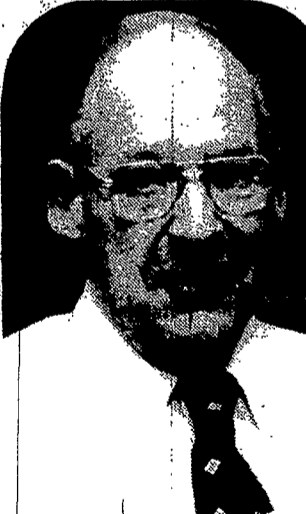
## AQ Honors McCarthy

Father John Menner, Aquinas principal, has announced that William F. McCarthy will retire on June 30.

McCarthy, during his 30 years with the school, has taught English and in 1974 became director of Public Relations. He also handled the Aquinas sports program along with being a mission and bowling moderator and a lector at the shut-in Masses.

Over the years he has been affectionately referred to as "Mr. Aquinas Institute." He never missed an event — whether it was a football game, graduation or a wedding. McCarthy himself has said, "Aquinas has provided me with the 30 happiest years of my life."

He has received many tributes over the years but this year's honors will be especially remembered. The 1978 senior class presented him with an engraved plaque which in part read: "May God be
