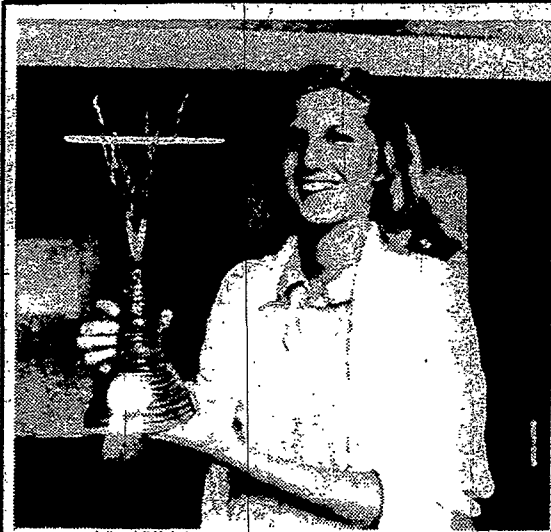

Summer Study Program

A remedial summer school program and a typing enrichment course will be offered at Nazareth Academy, July 3-31. Section 5 and State High School Basketball Chairman Bill Farrell says some games from both tournaments may be played at The Henrietta Dome Arena next year.

Farrell says it depends on the financial arrangements. Most sectional games and state tournament games this Spring were played at the Rochester War Memorial which has announced increased rental rates for schoolboy basketball tournaments next year.

He says football playoffs don't make sense and he doesn't like the way Section 5 posed the question to schools to begin with.

Jefferson High Athletic Director Jim DeBell, writing in the Spring 1978 "Athletic Medicine Newsletter" says coaches and trainers should do everything humanly possible to insure positive handling of injured players.

DeBell says it's imperative that correct procedures be followed so that a player's injury is not compounded and the recovery period is not delayed.

Not all coaches, DeBell says, follow the prudent course of action they should; some will go to any length to keep the athlete in the game.
