presented checks to representatives of the projects receiving funding. In his remarks to the assembly, Bishop Hogan displayed his support of CHD and promised the continuation of a strong program.

have limited access to other funding sources, whether federal, state or private. It is the responsibility of Regional CHD Task Forces to stimulate and evaluate proposals for funding.

Keynote speaker Friday was Rochester Councilperson Joan Hensler who referred to the list of award winners as "encouraging and heart-warming" and stressed the importance of CHD.
