A United Community Chest evaluation task force, which recently completed an eight-month study of the Catholic Youth Organization, has concluded that the CYO is providing "effective services to the community.

The task force also recommended that UCC continue funding CYO programs and activities. The CYO this year received \$205,950 in Chest monies for fiscal 1978-79, an 8.8 percent increase over last year.

The study revelaed that CYO has "responded to changing community needs by attempting to continue some traditional athletic programs, but with a major focus of adding programs of a youth development nature."

A survey of local parishes, agencies, and schools, which was conducted as part of the study, indicated that CYO's present emphasis on developing programs focused on personal growth for youth "is consistent with the types of youth services deemed most needed by the community groups with which it works," the study said.

Survey respondents who said they utilized specific CYO programs stated they were "very satisfied" with them, according to the study.

The task force cited Thomas C. Cotterill, CYO executive director, as having a "thorough knowledge of programs being conducted by the agency and its staff."

Cotterill is "intimately involved in the day-to-day administration of programs, assessment of their effectiveness, and the formulation of new programs," the study said. "He appears to have excellent rapport with staff, other agencies and consumers."

A need to institute a sliding fee schedule for the agency's services was one of the task force's major recommendations. It also recommended that, because of some program changes in recent years due to decreased funding, the agency should attempt to secure and realistically project its long-range funding, from whatever sources, and tailor its programs accordingly. It also should clarify and specify costs of major services provided under Program Services and Inner-City Outreach, the task force stated.
