Bus Law Changed, NYSCC Hails Move

Albany (RNS) — New York Gov. Hugh Carey has signed into law a bill which will permit Catholic school students to be transported to the parochial school they legally attend instead of the one closest to their home.

The bill removed the wording in the Education Law which restricted busing of students to the "nearest available parochial school." This meant some Catholic school students were denied bus transportation to their own parish school or other preferred Catholic school because they happened to live closer to another parochial school.

He said the law was not only "religiously discriminatory" but also discriminated against the poor and minorities. He said the law limited the choice of the poor to one school and "completely ignored the ethnic parish school which often is the best training ground for minority students since it responds to their cultural needs and family backgrounds."

The bill had the support of the Federation of Catholic School Parents and the Catholic School Administrators Association, among others.
