The Fundamental Learning Skills Program introduced last year has now been expanded to include 11th graders as well as freshmen and sophomores. In the Foreign Language Department, a new Spanish for Hispanics course offers the Spanish speaking student an opportunity to learn to read and write in the language. French 4 has been restored after an absence of two years necessitated by insufficient registration. Corning Continuing Programs

Corning Registration at the Corning Catholic Schools will remain at about 375 students for the coming year. Sister Ann Miller, principal of the two schools, reports.

The basic educational program will remain unchanged from last year, sister noted. One of the continuing programs is in cooperation with the Corning City School District, to identify gifted and talented students, and provide programs for them. Sister Ann noted that two teachers from the Catholic schools have participated in the workshops given by the school district under the federally-sponsored program.

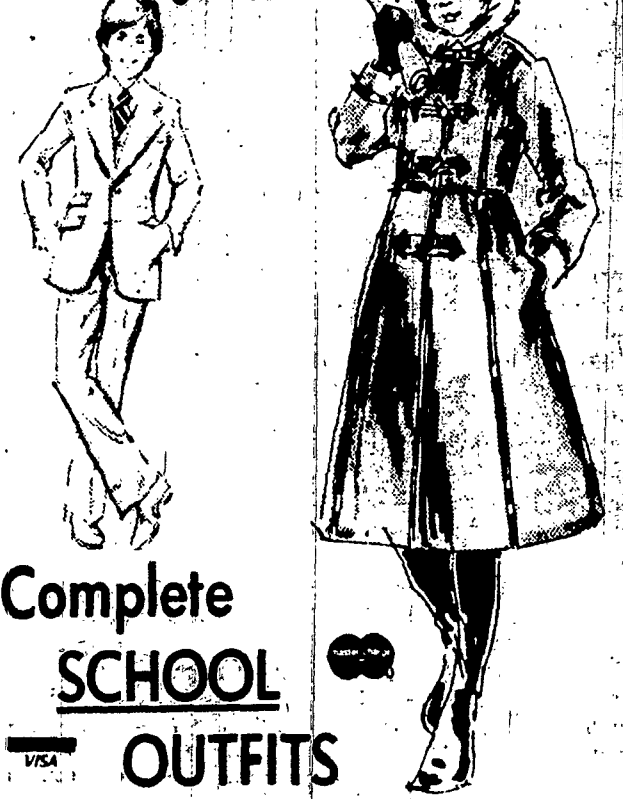
Sister also noted that the music program at the two schools, which involves two teachers, will be continued and improved this year.

A Religious Activities Committee formed at the end of the last school year also should have some impact this year, sister said. The committee, which includes the religious education coordinators from the three Corning parishes and herself for the school, she explained, will be looking for "enrichment and enrichment programs for faith experiences" that will benefit all the children of the three parishes. Prospective projects include special liturgies, and tours planned for various age levels, she noted.
