

# Cardinals Add Foes To Gridiron Schedule

Cardinal Mooney will field girls' varsity soccer team for the first time this fall, says Ed Nietopski, athletic director.

Nietopski returns for his 15th season as head basketball coach. Al Cretney will be in charge of the JV cagers.

Ralph Clapp returns for his 15th year as head coach of the girls' varsity wrestling team. Joette Abbey is back for girls' volleyball and Kathy Krenzer returns for girls' basketball.

Another Ray Powers will be in charge of tennis and there's an opening for boys' golf — Mike Swka, left Mooney for

another teaching job elsewhere.

Joette Abbey is back for girls' softball and Kathy Krenzer returns for girls' track.

Mooney won the City-Catholic soccer crown last fall and took top league honors in Private-Parochial girls' volleyball.

Nietopski says the general outlook for Mooney athletics for the coming season is good.

The girls' program will be as strong as it has been in the past, and the varsity football team is about to play its toughest football schedule ever.

"Toughest" includes traditional City-Catholic rivals like Aquinas, McQuaid, Bishop Kearney and Madison, but the Cardinals have added non-conference foes such as Monroe, East Rochester and Fairport this season.

Soccer lost a number of starters via graduation, but there are a number of enthusiastic juniors ready to fill in, and cross country, although on the youthful side, could mature into a surprising competitor, Nietopski says.

He expects wrestling and basketball to be stronger this year and baseball, although wiped out severely by graduations, is expected to be

representative, as usual.

Track, golf and tennis are also on the upswing, Nietopski says.

## Sr. Captain At Ithaca

## Reading Habits

How much effect will having a newspaper in the house, or using one in conjunction with schoolwork, have on children? Quite a bit, according to a report published recently by the Newspaper Advertising Bureau, entitled "The Influence of Childhood Exposure to Newspapers on Adult Newspaper Habits."

According to the study, in which more than 3,000 adults were interviewed, four out of five recalled that there was generally a newspaper at home during their adolescence.

Today, 70 per cent of these people read a newspaper regularly.

Almost half (43 per cent) recalled that a newspaper had been introduced into the classroom as a regular part of their schoolwork.

Today, 66 per cent of these adults read a newspaper frequently, as opposed to 62 per cent of those who did not have exposure to a newspaper in school.

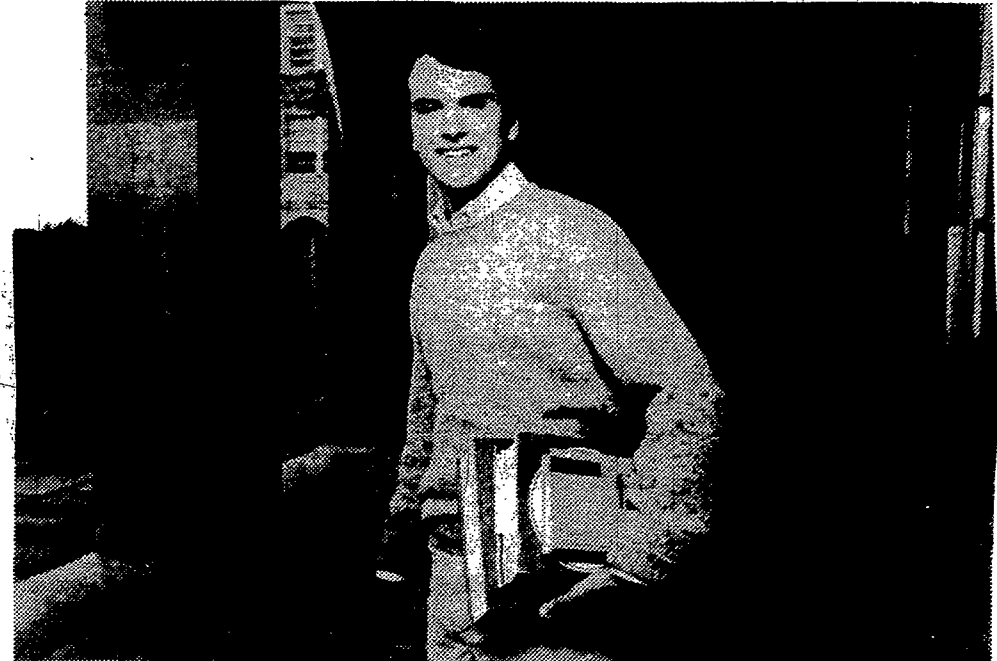

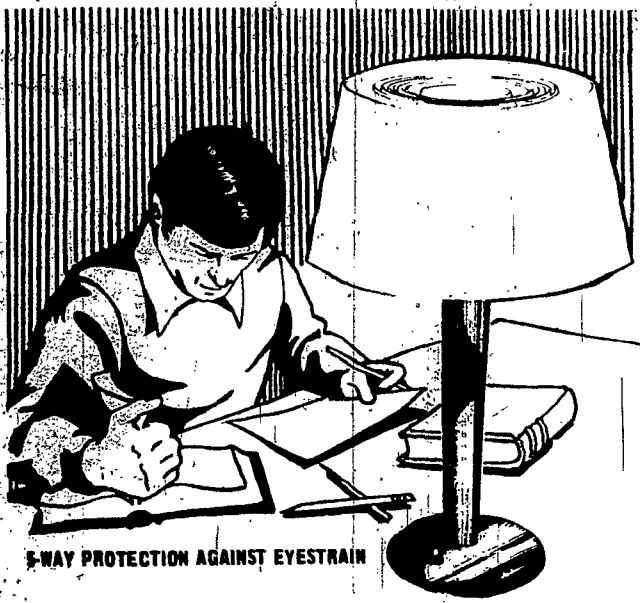
The McNally Scholarship was established in 1954 in memory of the late John "Yanno" McNally, a Rochester native and

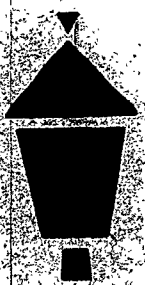
