Is Confirmation Too 'Rite Centered'?

In the fall of 1977 the Confirmation Task Force, after two years of shared study and research, went on the road with five diocesan workshops. The road, as we had anticipated, was not a smooth one. Our approach to Confirmation did not meet with immediate acceptance or overwhelming enthusiasm. Indeed, in some instances, the reactions could not have been any stronger if we had come out in favor of sin! In most

instances, however, our remarks were met with thoughtful reflection and fruitful dialogue, A number of "problems" came to light that needed serious consideration.

One of the most widely expressed difficulties that surfaced in the workshops was the problem of catechesis. Presenting Confirmation as a sacrament of Initiation would require a total rethinking of our catechetical program. We could no longer "use" Confirmation as a means of "keeping our youth coming" for catechetical instructions. A formidable club would be removed from our catechetical arsenal. We would have to move from an almost exclusively child-centered catechesis to one that would be adult-oriented as

Such a shift in emphasis was seen by many as a serious problem that would adversely affect our catechetical effectiveness. Yet the very problem would seem to highlight a serious weakness in our present catechetical structure. Our catechesis

for too long a time has been "rite centered"; we have been preparing young people for the celebration of a sacramental rite, when we should have been preparing them for an ever deeper involvement in the living of the Christian life.

A more realistic program of Catechesis would be one directed toward helping the whole Church — adults as well as children — to live the constant, on-going process of conversion that is inherent in the Christian commitment.

Catechesis would be seen as a life-long involvement in catechetical instruction that, coupled

with liturgical experiences and Christian service would enable the whole community of the Church to live the Christian life to fullest capacity. Catechesis would be directed not simply toward a "captive audience" but to the entire body of the faithful.

"rite-oriented" catechesis would be replaced by a "Christianlife" catechesis. Catechesis would become a total community involvement, with as yet unexplored advantages for the Church. In such a context, the Sunday Eucharist, rather than Confirmation, would emerge as the sacrament that expresses our growth in Christian maturity.

On television there is a program called Wonder Woman. Single-handedly, Wonder Woman puts to flight the enemies of law and order. In Sunday's gospel we

meet another "wonder woman"—a Canaanite mother, whose faith drove a devil back into hell.

Well might many a woman today in our socalled Christian civilization wonder at this woman. They would kill their unborn babies, but this Canaanite, this pagan of an accursed race, left no stone unturned to save her daughter from demonic trouble. She overleaped her centuries-old hatred and sought help from the inveterate enemy of her people—a Jew.

But more -wonderful than her love was her faith. Her faith caused even Jesus to wonder. Somehow she had heard about Him. "Son of David," they were calling him. "Messiah." Perhaps He was. Anyway, she was desperate. She

would try, no matter what. "Lord, Son of David, have pity on me," she kept crying out. "My daughter is terribly troubled by a demon."
