# Two Mercy Sisters Are Braillists

Sisters Mary Constance
Casey and Mary Celeste Boyle
were teaching French at
Mercy High School when
they undertook to conquer
another "language" — braille.
Following a language-lesson
approach, and inspired by the
presence at school of a blind
student, they quickly learned,
and now they are both
working on books.

This story is told by Margaret Lakeberg, who is recruiting volunteers for the braille sessions that begin next week. Noting that blind children now are being "mainstreamed" into regular classrooms, Mrs. Lakeberg pointed out a need for the transcription of school texts, so that the children who cannot see may keep up with those who can.

Classes meet once a week for two or three hours from September into the Spring. Places and starting times follow.
