Sr. Theophila

Sister M. Theophila Hojka, SSJ, a teacher in the schools of the diocese for 62 years, died Aug. 28, 1978, at the age of 93. She was the oldest member of the St. Joseph Congregation. Her funeral was held on Aug. 30, the 75th anniversary of her reception.

The Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated in the Motherhouse Chapel by Fathers John Mulligan, Charles Mulligan, Alexander Stec, Joseph Jankowiak, Vincent McDonough, SJ, and Joseph Reinhart. Msgr. William Naughton and Father Frederick Walz also were present. Father Charles Mulligan gave the homily.

Sister Theophila, born in Poland, came here to enter the Sisters of St. Joseph and work among Polish immigrants. She taught at St. Stanislaus, Rochester, for a total of 35 years and at St. Casimir's, Elmira, for 14 years. She taught also at Sacred Heart Cathedral; St. Theodore's, Gates; St. John the Evangelist, Greece, and St. Francis de Sales, Geneva. In 1966, at the age of 80, she made her only visit to her native land.

Surviving are a sister, Pani Smoch, in Poland and a

number of nieces and nephews there and in the United States.

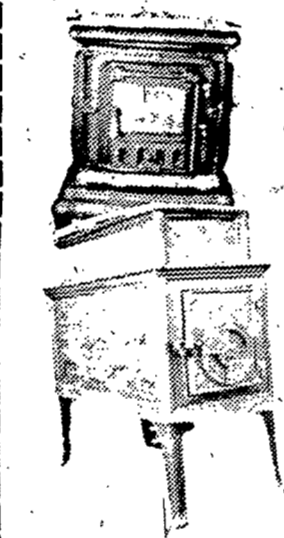
She was a member of the Ladies of Charity Auxiliary of St. Joseph's Hospital, the Women's Club, and a communicant of St. Patrick's Church.

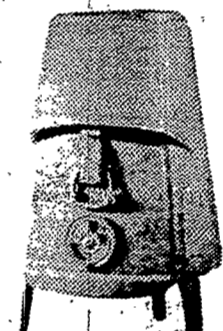
The priests also participated in the committal service, at St. Peter and Paul Cemetery.

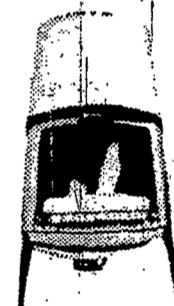

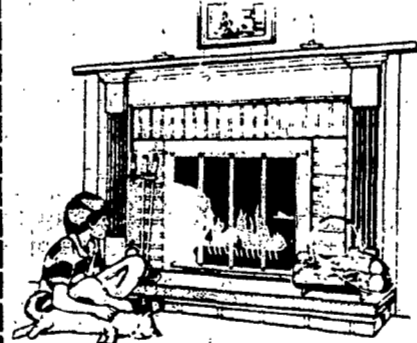

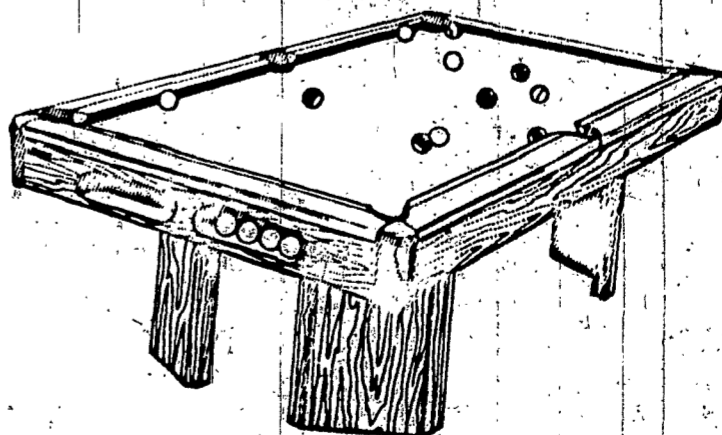
