Miss G.L. Baechle

Genevieve Baechle, formerly of Dohr Apartments, Latta Road, died Sept. 10, 1978, at St. Ann's Home, at the age of 72. The Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated last Wednesday in the chapel at St. Ann's by Father John Hempel.

Miss Baechle worked for Monroe County for 27 years, beginning in the probation department. At the time of her retirement in 1968 she was supervisor of the Commissioner of Jurors office. She was a parishioner of Old St. Mary's Church for 40 years.

Lately, she had lived at The Heritage with her sister, Loretta Baechle. "Everybody here marvelled at her," Miss Baechle said, commenting on Genevieve's acceptance of illness. "She was a kind and charitable person — for instance, last Fall, when she heard that doctors working in Guatemala after the earthquake needed wheelchairs for their patients, she donated one. She wasn't able to walk, herself."

The Baechles' relatives are 24 nephews and nieces in three generations, including Raymond M. Baechle of Coral Springs, Fla.; Walter F. Baechle of Greece, N.Y.; Mrs. Robert (Bernice) Betts of Waterville, O., and Mrs. Joseph (Florence) Maurer of Chicago. There are 13 grandnieces and nephews and seven in the relationship of great-grand.

Sr. Adelaide

Sister Mary Adelaide Major, a member of the faculty that opened Mercy High School in 1928, died Sept. 12, 1978, at the age of 84. The Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated last Thursday evening in the Motherhouse Chapel.

Sister Adelaide was Director of Novices for the Sister of Mercy from 1940 until 1949. She had taught Spanish, science and typing at the new high school during the preceding 12 years. She was on the first faculty of St. Charles Borromeo School in Greece, 1926-1928, and taught also at Mt. Carmel and St. Mary's, Rochester; St. Cecilia's, Elmira, and Holy Family, Auburn. She retired to the Motherhouse Infirmary in 1955.

Her long years in the infirmary were punctuated by daily group prayer, colleagues reported, and the Stations of the Cross were a favored devotion, even when she was confined to a wheel chair. She was an avid newspaper reader and a Scrabble enthusiast.

Sister Adelaide joined the Mercy Congregation in 1916, from Holy Apostles parish. She was educated at Canisius College and St. Bonaventure.

Surviving relatives are a sister, Mrs. Agnes Bothwick, Rochester; nieces and nephews and grandnieces and grandnephews.

Mr. Brennan

Thomas R. Brennan of Fanwood, N.J., an advertising executive who served the Catholic Press Association for

many years, died Sept. 7, 1978, after a long illness. The Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated Sept. 9 at St. Bartholomew's Church, Scotch Plains, N.J.

Mr. Brennan was national sales director of Catholic Major Markets, an organization he helped to establish in 1968. He was a founder also, and executive director, of Catholic Golden Age of Scranton, Pa. His career began in the advertising department of the Buffalo diocesan newspaper, which he joined in 1939.

He was born in Buffalo and educated at St. Joseph's Collegiate Institute and the University of Buffalo. During World War II he served with the Army Air Force in Europe, Africa and the Middle East.

Survivors are his widow, Betty; two daughters, Sharon and Karen, and four grandchildren, all of Fanwood; a brother, Clement J. Brennan of Buffalo, and a sister, Gertrude Mary Shea of Minot, N.D.

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The Franciscan Clarist Sisters conduct a host and boarding house for children three to 12 who attend the Catholic school in Chailakud India. It is a rented building, much too small and not at all safe. Yet the Sisters are forced to pay a very high rent. They seek to build a more adequate structure — one which will serve dual purpose — a home for themselves and children as well as include a chapel where the students can hear Mass and receive the sacraments. The Sisters raised as much money as they could from their community, the parents of the students and the people of the village. But most of them are very poor and much of the money was used to buy land for the building. A minimum of \$3,000 is still needed to complete the convent-chapel. For that, you can build the structure yourself, name it for your favorite saint and dedicate it as a Memorial for someone you love.
