A summer project is completed \$800 worth of audio-cassettes presented by the Diocesan Office of Religious Education have been prepared for circulation by the St. Bernard's Seminary library staff

"These cassettes are for all, especially those involved in catechetical ministry: catechists, coordinators, clergy, and seminarians," said Father Lewis Brown, director of Religious Education.

"The gift of 115 tapes puts our collection over 1000," said Father Jasper Pennington, library director. "The audio-casset library began five years ago with the purchase of talks on spirituality by the Trappist Thomas Merton. Our holdings are professionally recorded tapes, both academic and pastoral, in such areas as scripture, dogma, liturgy, morality, prayer and spiritual direction," he added.

The tapes presented by the Office of Religious Education deal with sacramental preparation youth ministry, adult education, family education, catechetical theory and creative teaching. The authors include Richard Reichart, Mary Reed Newland, Gloria Durka, Leon Mackenzie, James DeGiacomo, Christiane Brusselman and Al MacBride. "These are the latest by the best in the field," observed Father Brown.

Commenting on the cassette gift, Joseph Kelly, director of Continuing Education for the diocese said, "The future of the Seminary lies in extending services to the wider ministerial community as well as helping people see St. Bernard's as a valuable theological resource—this project has helped accomplish both of these tasks."


