Blessed Sacrament returns to Rochester."

Genca himself was distributing such cards.

Genca claims the society is a reaction against "an injustice. We have a need for the Mass, and we don't have any Mass."

The Tridentine Mass, he says, should have a "pride of place." He states the Church demonstrates "a glaring contradiction by suppressing it with no rhyme or reason."

To the layman, the Tridentine Mass is characterized by the use of Latin. This however is not the only difference in the rite. In the Tridentine form, the priest celebrant has his back turned to the congregation for most of the ceremony, reads two Gospel texts, recites a number of prayers "sotto voce," and is far more limited in liturgical action than in the present rite.

In the course of his sermon, Father Randolph alluded to the Battle of Lepanto, an occasion in which legend has the rosary playing a major role in the defeat of Turkish hordes. The pope at the time urged the Christian soldiers to arm themselves with the prayer of the rosary before the battle. Father Randolph said, "The pope then was a real pope, not a puppet."

The congregation at the "Rosary Chapel" had no visible common denominator. Of the nearly 100 participants in the Tridentine liturgy, there were people of all ages, black and white, ostensibly wealthy and evidently not wealthy.

Of the women who attended, about as many were wearing head coverings as were not.

A majority of the congregation received Communion. — Dash.

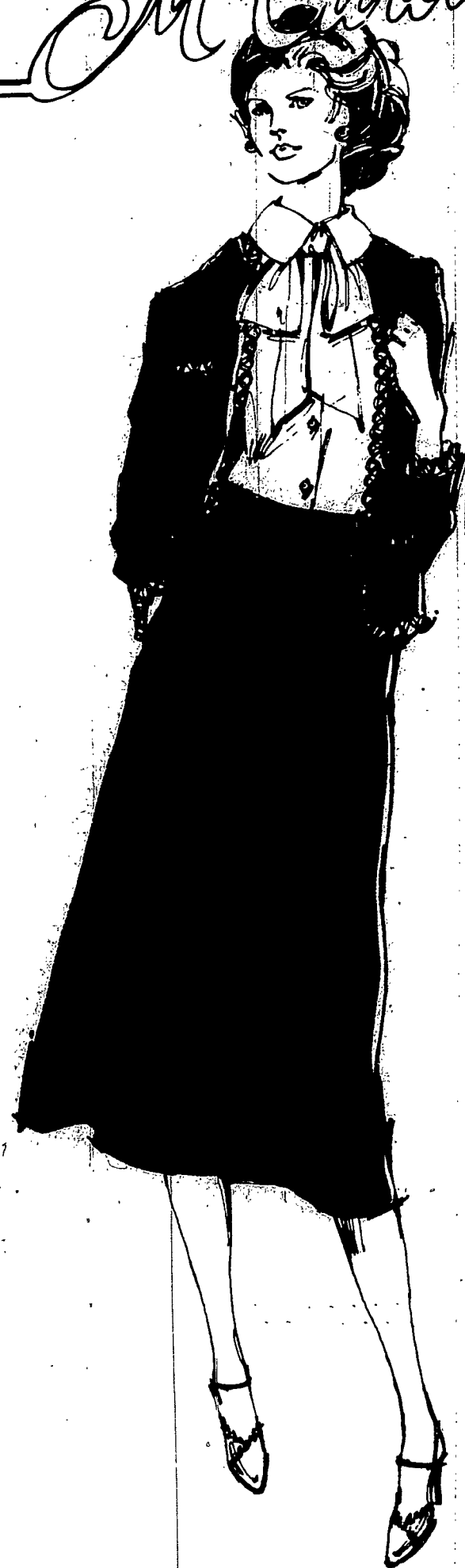
