A solemn nine-day novena in honor of St. Jude the Apostle will begin Friday, Oct. 20, at St. Jude's Church, 4100 Lyell Road.

Father John J. Steger, pastor, has announced that Mass with special prayers will begin at 7:30 p.m. each day through Saturday, Oct. 28. Father Cronan Maxwell of the Capuchin Order will conduct the novena.

A communal Anointing of the Sick is planned for Thursday evening of the novena. On the feast of St. Jude, Oct. 28, Auxiliary Bishop Dennis W. Hickey will be the principal celebrant of the Mass of Solemn Closing.

"Everyone is invited," Father Steger said, "to come and pray to the patron of hopeless cases and impossible causes, a devotion which in recent years has grown to be endeared to Catholics."

Father Steger founded the parish 10 years ago on the site of a former dairy barn and his people transformed the barn into the present church. The church is on ground level, with no steps, enabling the handicapped to enter easily.
