Diocesans At Pope's Last Public Audience

Owego-Eight St. Patrick's parishioners attended Pope John Paul's last public audience Wednesday, Sept. 27.

Pope John Paul died the following day.

The group, all members of the Third Order of St. Francis at St. Patrick's, were Mrs. Ann Williams, order prefect; James and Mary Cavataio, Mrs. Lillian Blazer, Frank McGovern, Frank Baker, Mrs. Elizabeth Kirch and Genevieve Heffron.

Miss Heffron reports that "like all the other thousands of people assembled in St. Peter's, the eight cheered and applauded as the Pope was borne down the center of St. Peter's, and like everyone else who has seen the Pope, they felt intensely the love and the joy that flowed from his radiant, beautiful face."

The 7.000 persons in the basilica fell silent as the Pope, robed in white, spoke and imparted his blessing, she recounted. After the audience in the basilica, he received 12,000 more in the audience hall.

Miss Heffron noted that "we weren't more than six feet from the Pope," as Father Stephen Valenta, OFM, their tour guide, had gotten excellent tickets. "It was really an experience,' she noted, adding that its meaning increased with the news of the Pope's death.

The papal audience was part of a two-week spiritual pilgrimage that included Milan, Padua, Venice, Assisi, Florence, Loretto and Rome.
