

## Studying Youth Will Aid Church

I will not try to hide my enthusiasm about the study which the Knights of Columbus



Fr. Greeley critical institutional? problem the Church faces is the bextraordinary decline of vocations in the last 15 years.

The refusal of all Catholic agencies to seriously investigate the before problem,

Knights decided to do something about it, has always baffled me. All too easily our church leadership accepted the inevitability of vocational decline and busily closed down training institutions without ever bothering to figure out why.

It's high time we found out about vocations. The Knights are to be commended for their courage in taking the lead.

I suppose I'm prejudiced in the matter, because my colleagues William Mc-Cready and Terry Sullivan will be the principal investigators in the project. Even more important than the fact that the National Opinion Research Center (NORC) will do the study is the decision of the Knights to settle for Knights settle for

nothing less than professional competent research. The Church has been content too long with second-rate efforts, not all of them inexpensive by any means.

I am not saying that NORC is the only research organization in the country capable of highquality survey research, there are at least a halfdozen other groups who compete with us head-tohead in government contract work. I think the boss might object if I listed our rivals in public print, but I would be happy to provide them to any Catholic agency which would prefer not to get involved with an organization where I work (at least some of the time).

I would have to warn the potential client, however, that we probably have an edge in research on the sociology of religion a and the sociology of Catholicism (only because we are the only one of the

nation's top academic research institutions that has done much in these areas).

The cost of such survey research comes high, but Virgil Dechant and the Knights of Columbus decided that when you're dealing with the future of the Church, cost ought to be no obstacle to quality.

Professors McCready and Sullivan will not solve the vocation shortage, but when their work is done, Church policymakers, who have to make the decisions about vocations and the youth apostolate, will have a lot more and a lot better information available than they have now.

My own guess is that all of us will encounter some extraordinary surprises. We may end up discovering that young people are far more religious, in some ways, at any rate, than we are inclined to believe at present.

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## Vocations Chairperson




SISTER **KATHLEEN MARY**
