Why Is The Title **Dropped?**

Fr. Cuddy equently, when I travel alone, I say the rosary, and this day the beads were bright red, quite visible in my right hand as I opened the door to let my guest in. After introducing myself, and asking his name, I engaged him in conversation. After a few minutes of icebreaking, I enquired:

"Where do you go to school?"

"McQuaid."

"Oh. And what are you studying in religion?"

"Theology," he replied

My mind drifted off to the signs at Rochester General Hospital, where on many doors is an impressive sign reading Environmental Services. These are the doors to the closets where the mops and pails and cleaning materials are kept. I wondered why a nice word like "housekeeping" was

not used, and supposed that the flamboyant term tickled the ego. Likewise, the term "theology" usually is reserved for seminaries and colleges, but I suppose using it for high schools tickles the ego there. After this quick

reverie, I proceeded:

"The Gospel of Luke." (The Saints have been stripped of their titles.)

"Oh. And are you interpreting it correctly?"

"Yes," he declared

"Did you know that Saint Luke was the only New Testament author who was a Gentile?

He stirred forward with genuine interest and expressed surprise. "Why no! Is that so?"

"Yes. As you study his Gospel you will notice how unlike it is to Saint Matthew's. Saint Luke wrote for the Gentiles, so he does not have all the Old Testament references, and Jewish customs, laws, traditions, which you find in Saint Matthew, who was a Jew writing for Jews. If you really want to study Saint Luke, why don't you invest \$4 at a book store and order Dr. William Barclay's Gospel of St. Luke. It is one of a set of 17 books called Daily Bible Studies, but you can get individual copies. McQuaid book store could get it for you. Archbishop Sheen recommends Dr. Barclay, who is a Protestant scripture scholar. His books are used by many priests and lay

We parted amiably, and later I narrated the encounter to some priest friends. One asked, "Did he call you 'Father?'" Pausing to recall, I replied, "No. Now that you speak of it, he didn't." "I have never met a McQuaid student," he said, "who ever addressed me as 'Father.'"

"That's curious. The Witnesses of Jehovah don't either, but for different reasons. However, I do not think the non-use of our title is peculiar to McQuaid. The children in most Catholic schools I know of do not address the priest by any title, though they do not hesitate to call a doctor by his title, or a Sister by hers. With all the concern about lack of religious vocations, I wonder what kind of religious training the youth

are getting.'

I suppose this article will get me into hot water. But after emotions have subsided would it not be a good thing to study the answer to the question: "Why are not Catholic youth trained in the ordinary courtesies of address?" Lest there be any anguish that this is an attack on McQuaid and the Jesuits, let me assure all that I have met courteous McQuaid students who do not cavil about a priest's title. In fact, I discussed this article with a 1973 graduate of McQuaid, who said, "If I have sons they will go to McOuaid." Which is a good recommendation. But the question up for discussion and research is:


"What is at the root of the quite common non-use of a title accepted in civil society by Catholics, non-Catholics, Jews and nonbelievers? What is the answer?"

New York (RNS) - A coalition of the three major Protestant, Catholic and Jewish relief agencies has announced a public appeal for funds to combat world

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The Thanksgiving Hunger Fund, termed an unprecedented interreligious project by the organizers, will ask every American to "give more than thanks" at Thanksgiving.

The organizers are asking Americans for donations of \$10, which they say is the orice of a I hanksgiving meai. However, no overall goal has been set for this year's appeal.

The fund was organized by Church World Service, overseas relief and development arm of the National Council of Churches; Catholic Relief Services, and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

The first president of the fund is Bishop Edwin B. Broderick, executive director of Catholic Relief Services. The nationwide solicitation will include public service

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television and radio announcements, distribution of donations envelopes in supermarkets and other stores and an education campaign on the issue of world hunger.


