## Women's Ordination: A Continuing Issue

The issue of women's ordination will be fully investigated at the Second Conference on the Ordination of Roman Catholic Women to be held at the Baltimore Civic Center, Nov. 10-12. It will feature three days of Eucharistic celebrations, meetings, discussions, reflections, films and guest speakers. According to Rosalie Muschal-Reinhardt, coordinator for the Rochester Women's Ordination Conference, 34 Monica St., about 40 persons from this area will be attending the Conference.

The Conference will not only be delving into the dilemma of women's ordination here in the U.S. but will tackle the problem as it exists throughout the world. There will be a special panel discussion at 4 p.m. on opening day concerning "Ordination: Not Just U.S." Panel members will include women from a variety of nations: Betsy Hollants, Mexico; Gloria Rodrigues, Paraguay; Cecilia Namayanja, IHM, Uganda; Tine Halkes, Belgium; Amala Michael, ICM, India.

This November conference is a continuation of the dialogue in the Church for the acceptance of women to full sacramental ministry. According to background information supplied by the Women's Ordination Organization, the first group to begin talking about the ordination of women was St. Joan's International

Alliance, a group of women and men begun in England in 1911 to work for the full equality of women with men in church and society. In the early 70s in the United States, a woman named Jean Barnes began to write long letters in "The National Catholic Reporter" about why women should be priests.

At the same time in Europe, The Association of Women Aspiring to the Presbyterian Ministry was formed by a 70-year old Belgian contemplative, Sister Valentine Bussaret. It was brought to the U.S. by Mary B. Lynch, a laywoman who was present in Rome for the synod of 1974.

Unable to have the topic raised at the synod, she called a meeting in December, 1974, to see how many people were concerned about the issue. This resulted in the first Conference on the Ordination of Women, in Detroit, Nov. 1975, with further follow up on the question in January and May 1977.
