Development Response

Diocese totaled \$118,500. After 12% was set aside for administrative expenses, 75% (\$78,210) of the monies remaining went to the National Campaign Office for allocation to self-help projects from across the country that requested more than \$10,000. The 25% (\$26,070) that remained was made available to regional CHD task forces for grants to local self-help projects meeting CHD guidelines.

This year National funding was awarded to GROUP 14621, a community organization in the 14621 zip-code area of Rochester. The Tioga County Well-Child Clinic and the Schuyler County Barter Transport System were among the 12 projects which received local funding.

The theme of this year's Campaign Appeal is: "Where there's a thirst for justice . . . Campaign for Human Development". There are many people in our country still thirsting for justice and we must continue our efforts to create a more just society. The 1978 Campaign for Human Development Appeal offers us an opportunity and a challenge. Our generous contributions to this appeal can provide a continuing response to the needs of the poor and powerless among us.
