

# Many Bishops Produced In Diocese

When Msgr. Joseph Lloyd Hogan was named seventh bishop of Rochester in 1969, he brought to 16 the number of bishops contributed to the hierarchy of the Church from the counties of the Rochester diocese.

He was the ninth cleric who was a priest of the diocese at the time of his selection by the Pope to be a bishop.

And he was the 19th American archbishop or bishop to receive all or part of his education at St. Bernard's Seminary. Since that time, Bishop Frank Harrison brought the number to 20 when he was ordained bishop of Syracuse in 1976.

Bishops who were priests of this diocese have been (in the order of their year of consecration):

Bishop Thomas A. Hendrick — 1903, Cebu, Philippine Islands.

Bishop Thomas F. Hickey — 1905, Rochester.

Archbishop Edward J. Hanna — 1912, San Francisco.

Bishop John Francis O'Hern — 1929, Rochester.

Bishop Walter A. Foery — 1937, Syracuse.

Bishop Lawrence B. Casey — 1953, Rochester, then Paterson, N.J.

Bishop Dennis W.

Hickey — 1968, Rochester.

Bishop John E. McCafferty — 1968, Rochester.

Bishop Joseph L. Hogan — 1969, Rochester.

Bishops who were born or served within the diocesan counties:

Bishop John N. Neumann, CSSR, — 1852, Philadelphia.

Bishop Bernard O'Reilly — 1850, Hartford.

Bishop Francis X. Krautbauer — 1875, Green Bay, Wis.

Bishop James Edward Quigley — 1896, Buffalo, then Chicago.

Bishop Francis J. Green — 1953, Tucson, Ariz.

Summarizing the hometowners of the diocesan priests who became bishops:

Bishop Hendrick came from Penn Yan; Thomas Hickey, Hanna, O'Hern, Foery and Casey from Rochester; Dennis Hickey from Dansville; McCafferty from Geneva; Hogan from Lima.

Lima, in Livingston County, was also the hometown of Archbishop James Edward Quigley. Subsequently a priest in the Buffalo diocese, he became bishop of Buffalo in 1896 and archbishop of Chicago from 1903 to 1915.

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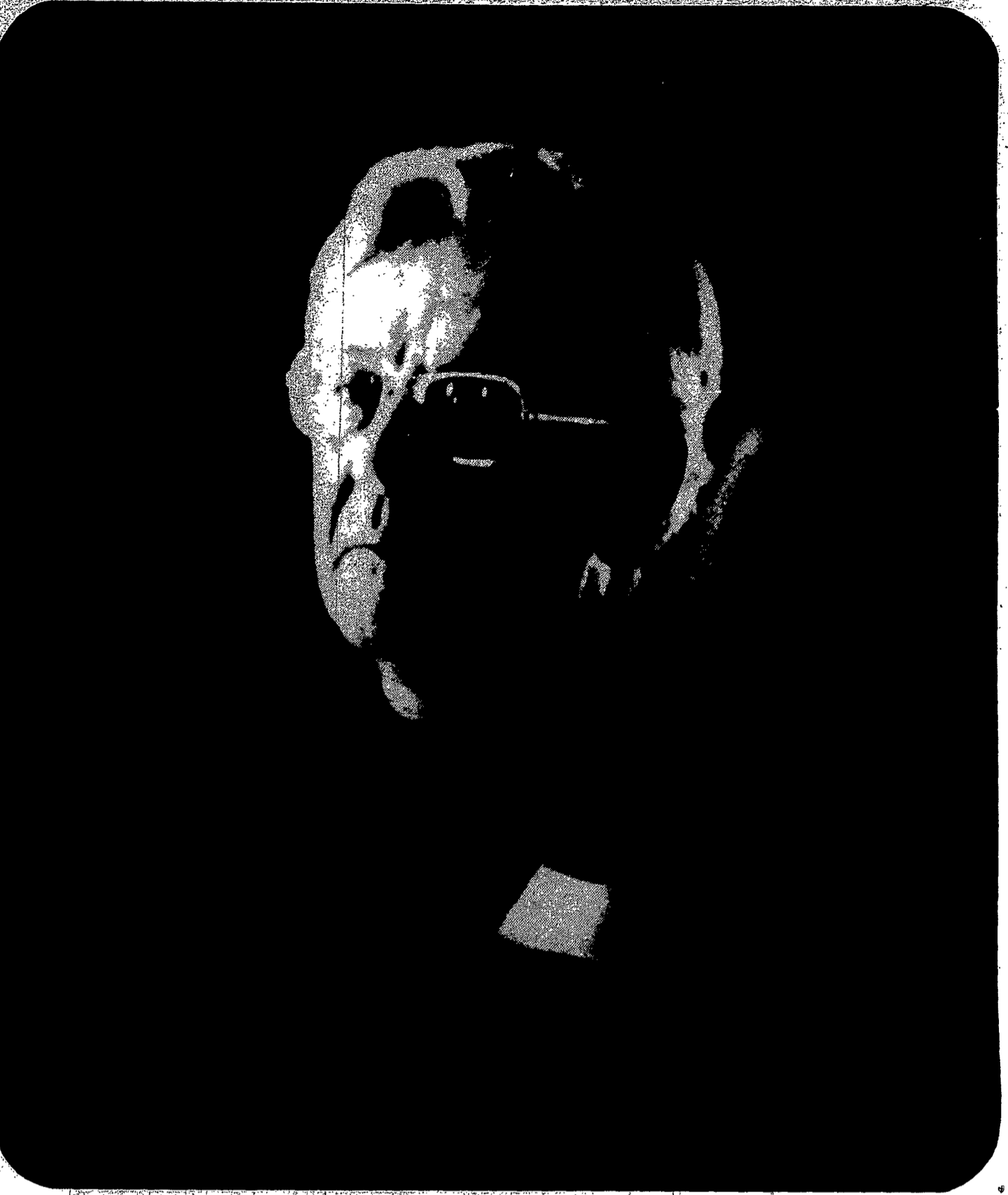

## Bishop Hogan Biographical Data

Born: March 11, 1916 in Lima.

Parents: Michael C. Hogan and Mary Shaw Hogan (both deceased).

Schools: St. Rose, Lima; Lima High School; St. Andrew's Seminary, St. Bernard's Seminary.

Ordained: June 6, 1942, by Bishop James E. Kearney in Sacred Heart Cathedral.

### Assignments and Further Studies

1942-45 — Assistant, St. Mary's Church, Elmira.

1945-49 — Professor of Latin and Social Studies, St. Andrew's Seminary.

1949 — Master of Arts Degree, Canisius College, Buffalo.  
— Teacher, summer school at Canisius College.

1949-51 — Graduate studies in theology at Pontifical University Angelicum, Rome, Italy, degree, Doctor of Sacred Theology (STD).

1951-53 — Faculty, St. Andrew's Seminary, teaching Latin and religion.

1953-55 — Principal, DeSales High School, Geneva.

1955-65 — Faculty, St. Bernard's Seminary, professor of Fundamental Dogma, Dean of Studies and professor of Catechetics. Also professor of theology at St. John Fisher College and ascetical theology at Sisters of St. Joseph Novitiate.

1965-67 — First rector, Becket Hall, diocesan preparatory seminary residence adjacent to St. John Fisher College.

1966 — Raised by Pope Paul VI to rank of domestic — relate with title of Right Reverend Monsignor.

1968 — Appointed pastor of St. Margaret Mary Church, Irondequoit, June 27, 1968.  
— Named a diocesan consultant by Bishop Fulton J. Sheen.

1969 — Named seventh bishop of Rochester, Oct. 15; ordained and installed at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Nov. 28.

Nov. 1978 — Resigned as bishop because of poor health, Nov. 28.
