

Pine City - John's Gospel includes a prayer by Jesus for unity among His followers, Father Robert Kanka said at the Prayer for Christian Unity observance Jan. 14.

"The more united His followers are," he told the approximately 100 persons attending, the more credibility they will have.

That is the value of the ecumenical movement, he said, to bring "more unity to our ranks," and thereby be better able to glorify God.

Father Kanka, of St. Patrick's, Elmira, was the homilist at the annual service, this year at the Pennsylvania Avenue United Methodist Church.

The ecumenical movement began in the "early years of this century," he noted, first among the Protestant faiths. He pointed to the World Council of Churches as a sign of unity among the Protestants. Later the Orthodox joined the movement, he recalled.

Then Vatican II brought the Catholics into the movement, he noted.

The theological dialogue among the faiths has been successful, he noted, as it has raised points of agreement and disagreement. Resulting statements have shown many areas of broad agreement, perhaps more than we realized," he commented.

He also stated that experience has shown that to be successful, the ecumenical movement must be undertaken by the whole of a church's membership, and not just by its leaders or theologians.

Opportunities for common activities and prayer should continue, he said, noting especially the value of Christians praying together.

Father Kanka stated that he believes the success the ecumenical movement has had has occured with the guidance of God. And, he concluded, if present effort continues, "there will be success, and in this God will be glorified."

Several local clergymen participated in the service, including Father Albert Delmonte, pastor of St. Anthony's, Elmira; Rev. Peter Courtney of Grace Episcopal Church; Rev. Fred Turner the host pastor; and Rev. Harry Taylor of Central Christian Church. Paul Holland served as song leader.




