PEGGY'S KUCHEN **Basic Sweet Dough**

2 pkg. active dry yeast; half cup warm water (110 degree F.); 4 cups regular all-purpose flour; half cup sugar; 1 tsp. salt; threequarters cup butter or margarine; half cup milk, scalded and cooled; 2 eggs, slightly beaten; butter, melted.

Sprinkle yeast over water to dissolve. When completely dissolved, sprinkle a few granules of the sugar into the yeast mixture to start yeast action. (I think Red Star Yeast is the best, by the

(Use your imagination for filling. Peggy varies hers. But for this recipe will use cinnamon, golden seedless raisins, powdered sugar, maraschino cherries and a teaspon of vanilla).

In large mixing bowl, combine flour, sugar and salt. On low speed of mixer cut butter into flour mixture until it resembles coarse meal.

milk, eggs and dissolved yeast. Add to dry ingredients, mixing thoroughly. Brush with melted butter, cover and chill overnight.

Divide dough into equal portions. Roll out each into a rectangle about a quarter-inch thick. Brush with melted butter; sprinkle with mixture of sugar and cinnamon; a layer of golden seedless raisins. Roll up like jelly roll from long side; tuck one end into the other, securely forming a ring. Place ring in a round pie or cake tin which has been very lightly greased. With a pastry cutter, cut halfinch slices around entire ring, being careful to only cut about three quarters of the way into center of ring. Take one slice twist and lay it on its side; next slice, twist, lay on its side, overlapping first slice, and so on around ring. Brush with melted butter. Let rise until doubled in warm place; about one to one and a half hours.

Bake at 350 for 30 to 35 min. until golden brown. Cool. Frost with thin laver of icing made from butter, 1 tsp. vanilla powdered sugar and milk. Decorate

with maraschino cherries.
This is best served warm. About 10 to 15 minutes in a 350 oven.

It can be frozen, wrapped in foil. Thaw at room temperature, then

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






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
