institution," and has been visible. He said that he has tried to listen to the inmates' needs and "help them help themselves."

"Some of them (are) beginning to think" about their lives, Stanley said, but they find change difficult. It is important to "let them see that they're individual human beings. They're OK; what they did is not OK, but they're OK."

Liturgies are important to many inmates, they noted. The prisoners are "very, very reverent in church," Sister Josepha recounted, and often outsiders "can't believe that liturgy and prayer time means so much" to them.

In addition to the work in Elmira, Father Tormey says Mass each Saturday at Camp Monterey, and Stanley conducts classes there on Tuesdays. "Part of the whole thing is being able to follow-up" when inmates move among the three facilities, Stanley noted, and that has been working.

A future goal, Father Tormey said, is to involve persons outside the prison in the work. "People on the outside have got to be concerned about the Church inside," he said. He mentioned the need for jobs and housing upon release as being two problems where those outside the prison can provide assistance.
