Cardinal Dies

Cardinal Jean Villot has died at the age of 73.

The man who had held the second ranking post in the Church, and twice last year ruled the Church as its administrator, died at the Vatican

Cardinal Villot Dies, Secretary of State

Vatican City — Following a brief illness, Cardinal Jean Villot, who held the second highest post in the Vatican, died last week at the age of 73.

Cardinal Villot died in his Vatican apartments, where he was taken from Rome's Policlinico Gemelli Hospital, Friday, March 9, 1979.

The cardinal was hospitalized Monday and during the week developed acute bronchial pneumonia and intestinal hemorrhaging, and, eventually, kidney failure. He was visited by Pope John Paul II on Thursday.

The French prelate who had served ten years as Vatican Secretary of State, twice last year also served as administrator of the entire Church, in the interregnums following the deaths of Popes Paul VI and John Paul I.

He was named a cardinal in 1965, after 35 years of pastoral and teaching work in France. Two years after his cardinalate, he was named to preside over the Synod of Bishops, a body the pope had created after the Second Vatican Council.

Then, in 1969, Cardinal Villot was given the second highest post in the Church.

At the time of his appointment as Secretary of State, succeeding Cardinal Amleto Cicognani, who had retired, Cardinal Villot became the first non-Italian

in 55 years to hold the post.

It was reported at that time that certain members of the Roman Curia were disgruntled over the choice. Cardinal Villot was the first churchman in modern times who had no diplomatic experience prior to his being given the job of overseeing Vatican embassies around the world.

Also at that time, Cardinal Villot was described as hard-working and chain-smoking.

 Cardinal Villot was named chamberlain of the Holy Roman Church in 1970. It was in that capacity that Cardinal Villot acted as administrator of the Church.
