"I hope to be with the aging, perhaps alone - to thank them.

"I don't know how I will do these things now. But I hope the people will help me. For the diocese of Rochester is not the bishop's work but the work of the people. If I can call people forward to that I will have done what I wanted to do -- to be a pastor."

Father Clark's typical day begins at 6:30 a.m. He attends staff meetings and conducts student interviews through the day. He also is chaplain at Marymount School, an international high school for girls. He also coordinates activities with the other foreign colleges, such as the English and Scot, in Rome.

He also finds time for his running which helps him to keep lean. How tall is he? "I usually say six feet, though I'm not sure."

His typical day winds up with supper at 8 p.m.

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
