"I would like it to be a diocesan celebration with as many as possible participating.

That was how Bishop-elect Matthew H. Clark expressed his wishes for his installation which will take place at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, June 26 at the War Memorial in downtown Rochester.

And a special committee established to plan the installation is taking steps to bring as many diocesans as possible to the War Memorial to celebrate the installation of Rochester's eighth bishop.

Bishop Joseph L. Hogan, the former ordinary of the diocese and now its apostolic adminsitrator, says in a special message appearing in today's Courier-Journal, "I know you will want to welcome our new bishop with the warmth and endouragement you have always shown the bishops of Rochester."

arrangements will be made for busing to the War Memorial from all points in the diocese. More details on these plans also will be upcoming in the diocesan newspaper.

Tickets for the installation will be distributed on a limited basis through the parishes and from various groups and organizations throughout the diocese, said Anthony J. Costello, another member of the committee who is responsible for tickets, seating and the graphics of the invitations and program book.

A 150-member choir will perform, said Father Robert Kennedy, diocesan director of liturgy, who promised that the liturgical aspect of the celebration will be 'memorable and beautiful."

Father Douglas Hoffman, director of pastoral ministry, said that "narishes and regions will be greatly involved in the installation."

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Scene of Reported Visions Paster Dead, Veil Gone

Wyalusing Revisited

Wyalusing, Pa. — As the second anniversary of the first reported vision at St. Mary of the Assumption Church passed May 6, persons continued to visit the church; according to the parish's administrator, although the tabernacle veil that was the center of attention is no longer in the church.

Father Anthony Conmy. the pastor who first reported a vision on the church's tabernacle veil, died March 12 at the age of 52, and, according to his successor, the veil was buried with him as he rèquested.

It was Father Conmy who

saw the first vision on the veil May 6, 1977. Later that year, he told the Courier-Journal that he saw the image of the Virgin Mary on the veil, but didn't report it until a parishioner told him of a vision a few days later.

Word spread, and soon there was a constant stream of visitors to the small, whiteboard church, including many from the Rochester diocese.

Father William J. Mc-Cawley, parish administrator, began work at St. Mary's in January while Father Conmy was sick. He said that people are still coming, although "not many." Those that do come, he said, "don't know the veil is

Visitors to the church may be surprised to find that there is no veil at all on the tabernacle.

Robert Kinsman, of Towanda, was a follower of the events in St. Mary's, and was the first to take a picture that some say shows the face of the Virgin Mary.

Kinsman noted that after Father Conmy's funeral, a white-embroidered yeil replaced the one that had been the center of attention. But people continued seeing visions on that veil, he said. It was replaced with a purple one, and more visions were reported. It, too, was removed; he said, and since
