In discussing with the Courier-Journal his tasks as superintendent, Father indicated his primary challenge would be to maintain the life and vitality which he sees as the strong tradition of the Rochester Catholic schools. He also sees his job as keeping up the morale of teachers and parents - helping them to keep the faith in the Catholic educational system. He believes the system has weathered the storm of the last decade and that even with the shortage of religious personnel, schools are maintaining the Catholic essence. Regarding his ministerial

duties, Father hasn't worked in the Rochester area since teaching at Aquinas in 1960 but he has kept informed about his hometown.

"I see Rochester as a city of neighborhoods each with a distinctive personality," he explained adding, "and I see the Catholic schools contributing to their survival."

Father leaves a small Catholic school system in Albuquerque for the much larger one here in Rochester. St. Pius X is the only high school in Albuquerque (and one of only three throughout the state) with 10 grammar

schools feeding into it. Though his last four years have been primarily in administration, with stints at teaching Business Math and Theology, Father is no stranger to the classroom. Besides teaching at Aquinas Institute he has taught at Andrean High School in Gary, Indiana where he also served as vice principal and principal, Central Catholic in Detroit and at Pius X in Albuquerque from 1971-75.

He received his BA from St. Michael's College at the University of Toronto, his MA in History from Indiana University and an Education Specialist Certificate from the University of New Mexico.

Mother Magdalene, 82; Former Mercy Superior

Mother Mary Magdalene Schenck, a Sister of Mercy for 62 years, died May 5. 1979, at the age of 82. She had served two six-year terms as superior general of the Rochester congregation and had taught in its high schools and in parish schools for more than 30 years.


The Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated May 7 in the Motherhouse Chapel.

Mother Magdalene, a Rochester, was graduated from Nazareth Academy in 1916 and joined the Mercy Sisters a year later. She taught at Mt. Carmel, St. Mary's and St. John the Evangelist in Rochester; Holy Family in Auburn and St. John's in Clyde, before joining the faculty at Our Lady of Mercy High School. Later, she served at St. Patrick's, High School and Cardinal Mooney High School. Meanwhile, she had held various administrative posts. Her terms as superior general ran from 1940 to 1946 and

1955 to 1961. While she was teaching at Mercy, she earned a bachelor's degree in Latin and philosophy at Canisius College and a masters in Latin at St. Bonaventure University.

Sister Mary Judith Heberle, major superior, observed of Mother Magdalene that when she was superior general "we knew that she expected the best from each one of us. She never betrayed a confidence, she shied from the limelight . . . She was open to the new, yet always respectful of the old. She was gentle, soft-spoken, a deep thinker ... We will remember her always as a gracious lady filled with wisdom, a woman of faith and prayer . . .

Mother Magdalene retired o the Omega Community of senior sisters at the Motherhouse in 1972. Her relatives are a brother-in-law, Nicholas Konz of Naples, and several nieces and nephews.
