Tuttle's No-Hitter Leads Little Irish Over Edison

Aquinas senior Greg Tuttle pitched the City-Catholic League's first no-hitter of the year last week to lead the Little Irish over Edison, 2-0.

Tuttle's effort was near perfection as the only flaw in his performance was a base on balls given up with two out in the first inning.

"The walk really didn't affect me like it would have if I had given it up later on," Tuttle said. "It happened so early that I really didn't think anything of it."

Tuttle fanned nine men, using a blazing fastball to get ahead on the batters and then pulling another pitch out of his repertoire, a screwball.

"It's kind of a waste pitch, but they go after it," Tuttle said. "I throw it less to a left-handed batter because it breaks down and away from him, making it easier for him to hit rather than a right-handed batter."

I'd like to mention that Mark Magliocco, my catcher, called my pitches so he deserves a lot of credit, too.

Tuttle didn't have much time before the game to worry

about his pitching because he didn't find out he was starting until only a couple of hours before the game. He didn't spend much time worrying during the game, either.

"I was pretty relaxed through the whole thing," Tuttle said. "I had a couple of 3-and-0 counts on batters that I had to come back and get,

but I was confident. I didn't even worry about a no-hitter until after the fifth inning."

Tuttle admits the pressure did get to him in the seventh inning, but stayed cool along with his steady teammates. And the last out?

"After it was on the ground, I knew it was over," Tuttle

BASEBALL NOTES — In the battle for first place in the City-Catholic League's Carter Division, Cardinal Mooney beat Bishop Kearney, 5-4, at Silver Stadium last week. Mike Roach's single with two out in the seventh inning drove in the Cardinal's winning run.

Tim Barone hit two home runs and drove in nine runs as Mooney crushed Jefferson, 18-4.

Jim Ozminkowski had three hits, including a triple, and scored three runs to lead Bishop Kearney over McQuaid in a City-Catholic League game, 8-1. Brian Mack was the winning pitcher.

Mike Visconte hit two home runs and Lonnie Kazzka hit a three-run homer to help Aquinas to a 12-8 victory over host Marshall.

McQuaid captured its first Penn Relays high school title since 1969, winning the

1,600 meter race at Philadelphia's Franklin Field in 3:25.9. Craig Rice, Jim Malley, Rich Price and Vaun Grattet finished 15 yards ahead of ten other teams.

Craig Rice won the 200 meters in 22.5 seconds as McQuaid placed third among 22 schools in the Thousand Islands Invitational Track Meet at Brockville, Ont.

The Knights defeated Aquinas in a dual track meet, 86-60, as Mike Walker (high jump and triple jump), Mike Anderson (long jump and 120 high hurdles) and Rich Price (100-yard and 220-yard dashes) were double winners.

McQuaid's Vince Baiamonte scored a pin in four minutes over John Zito of East Rochester, the state champion at 167 pounds, in the 180-pound division of the Section Five Freestyle Wrestling Championships last week at Churchillville, Chili.

McQuaid swimmer Marty Mahoney has accepted a Loyola Scholarship to Canisius College. Mahoney holds City-Catholic League records in the 100-yard individual medley and the 100-yard backstroke, as well as swimming on the Knights' record-setting medley and freestyle relay teams. Loyola Scholarships are awarded to the outstanding graduates of Jesuit secondary schools.

GRAD-NOTES — Dick Buerkle(ex-Aquinas), former indoor mile world record holder, set a track record when he turned in a 14:01.25 time in the 5,000 meter run at the Spec Towns Track Invitational at the University of Georgia in Athens. Buerkle, who recently moved to Atlanta, bettered the old record by 20.45 seconds.

Jeff Weston (ex-Mooney), defensive tackle for the University of Notre Dame, was selected by the Miami Dolphins in the National Football League draft in the ninth round.

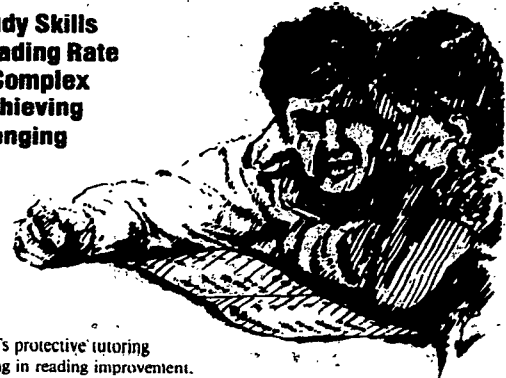
