Cassette Apostolate Is Real

When is the next Courier-Journal tour?

Don't you exaggerate the importance of the cassette tape apostolate?

Not at all. When Jesus said, "Go and teach all nations," the apostles had to use their feet and word of mouth to evangelize, and later a limited amount of hand-written things. The monks for centuries multiplied the Bible and other holy works by handwriting. When John Gutenberg invented the printing press in 1437, evangelization was revolutionized by the accessibility of these ideas to the world, through print. In our own time, the means of evangelization and propaganda expanded through radio and TV; and now the copiers: mimeograph machines, and especially copiers produced by Xerox.
