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J.P. Stevens Boycott **Effort** Continues

Elmira — The Chemung Councils. County Citizens for Justice for J. P. Stevens Workers is continuing its efforts sup-porting the boycott of J. P. Stevens' products.

• The national boycott has been supported by, among others, the National Conference of Catholic Charities, the National Council of Churches, the National Association of Women Religious, and the National Federation of Priests

Stevens is the nation's second-largest producer of textiles.

The local committee reports that it has contacted five local retailers and seven chain stores, asking them to remove Stevens' products from their shelves.

The committee has stated that it "hopes to impress upon the retailers the fact that when they offer Stevens'

products to their custom they give J. P. Stevens lice to continue illegal firin s intimidation and harassmith of workers, violation of healt and safety regulations and a general disregard for the people they employ."

St. James Accredited

Hornell --- St. James Mercy Höspital has been awarded the Certificate of Ac-creditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH) Spencer Crow, board of directors president, has announced.

The accreditation was achieved following a survey by a JCAH survey team. The hospital was evaluated on information gained from questionnaires, other documentation, and an on-site visit in March which included conferences with professional staff, service chief, and

hospital governing board members. As a result of the survey, the hospital received accreditation for the next two years. St. James has held the accreditation since it first requested a survey in 1954. Accreditation indicates that

the hospital has chosen to operate according to standards set by the JCAH and has been found to be in compliance with them. The program assists hospitals in pursuing a higher quality of health care through education, self-evaluation and consultation.

The letter of approval from John E. Milton, hospital accreditation program deputy director, stated: "The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals is pleased to inform you that your hospital has been awarded two year accreditation. This decision was reached by the JCAH Board of Commissioners af er a review of the findings fin the most recent survey of hospital. Through the award of accreditation, the Juin Commission commends your efforts toward providing patient care of quality."
